Lebanon City Council Streamlines Committees

Lebanon—The city council, on recommendation of Mayor Elmer Fitzgerald, has established two more committees.

Safety and welfare committee is one. The mayor said it will perform functions, particularly in case of emergency. Its chairman is Robert Heimerdinger and Glenn Huston and Dick Davis are assisting members.

Lebanon Notes Traffic Problem

Lebanon—Of the 329 arrests made by Lebanon police during 1952, 214 were because of traffic violations, Police Chief Ben Scheel stated in his annual report.

Speeding was the most common cause of arrest with 76 citations. Fifty-six arrests were made because drivers failed to have operator's licenses on their persons.

City police held seven for driving under the influence of liquor and 31 more were cited for reckless driving.

The year saw 295 complaints lodged with the department and 173 calls wanting officers.

A total of 32 persons were jailed by Lebanon police and 37 more were held in the local jail for other offenses.

Chief Scheel reported that seven cases of breaking and entering were reported during the year and that three of the cases were cleared by police.

Nine cars were stolen while 15 stolen vehicles were recovered here, the report states. Eighty stolen articles were reported with 25 being recovered.

Cases of prowling during the year amounted to 49 while 41 persons were reported as runaways.

During the year the jail had 37 sleepers while seven persons were floated from the city. Six were arrested as vagrants.

Arrested as drunk were 43, and 13 were cited for disorderly conduct.

Two were arrested for violation of the Dyer act which deals with transporting stolen cars across state lines.
