Philadelphia (AP)—The Rules Committee of the National Football League meets here Wednesday night to discuss proposed changes for recommendation to the NFL's annual meeting Thursday.

League President Bert Bell, chairman of the rules meeting, said no proposals have been made to follow the college lead and abolish the two platoon system.

The annual player draft begins Thursday with Baltimore, the newest team in the league getting first pick. The draft meeting is expected to consume the remainder of the day "and most of the night," Bell said.

Team owners and representatives of owners will participate in a series of business meetings on Friday.

Colorado Upsets Kansas; Tarheels, TCU, DePaul Win

Colorado's unranked basketball team blended scrappy floor play and free throw accuracy into a 72-68 upset Tuesday night of ninth-ranked Kansas.

The hustling Buffaloes pulled out of the Big Seven Conference basement with their first victory in four games. The loss, second in five league starts for Kansas, left the defending national champions in second place.

Kansas, which knocked Kansas State out of No. 1 ranking in the Associated Press poll last week, fell into the upset trap, which the oft-beaten Colorado club springs once a year. A year ago, Kansas State was smeared.

By slowing down the tempo of the game, Colorado caused Kansas players to foul repeatedly as they went into an aggressive mid-court press in an effort to get the ball.

North Carolina regained first place in the Southern Conference by coming from behind to beat Wake Forest, 72-68. The Tarheels were behind by 11 points, 26-37, at the half, but put on a second half drive to pull the game out of the fire.

Texas Christian, sparked by Henry Ohlen with 31 points, upset Rice, 69-60, in the Southwest Conference. The defeat kept Rice from gaining a first place tie with Texas.

DePaul nipped Cincinnati, 68-67, on two free throws by Russ Johnson in the last 90 seconds.

In other games Seattle beat Pacific Lutheran, 71-58, St. Mary's (Calif.) took San Jose State, 67-65 and Hardin-Simmons downed Midwestern, 69-51.

With Johnny at home in Seattle realising an ailing back, the Chieftains rolled up a 76-28 halftime lead over Pacific Lutheran College and coasted in with an easy 71-58 conquest.

Joe Pehanick, a junior playing his first year with the Seattle varsity, filled in for Johnny in the post and also took his role as No. 1 pointmaker. With Eddie O'Brien feeding him the ball, Pehanick, 6-foot-8-inch center, dropped in 24 points, tops for the evening. Eddie had 18 points.

Johnny O., one of the nation's leading scorers, is under treatment for a back injury received in a recent game with Gonzaga and aggravated in last Saturday's meeting with Portland. He's expected to resume his assault on collegiate scoring marks in next Saturday's game with San Francisco university here.

The win over Pacific Lutheran was the 14th in 16 starts for Seattle university, the 13th-ranked team in The Associated Press poll.

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Turner Whips Bobby Dykes At Philadelphia

Philadelphia (AP)—"Well, that's half the job done," said young Gil Turner as he sat on his dressing room table Tuesday night after whipping Bobby Dykes.

The 22-year-old Philadelphia welterweight has lost only two bouts in a 36-fight career, one to Dykes and one to welterweight champion Kid Gavilan. The thumping he gave Dykes avenged one defeat. But there's still Gavilan.

Turner wants to win the title from Gavilan to even the score on that other defeat.

The big question after the Dykes-Turner 10-rounder before 8,160 at the Arena, strangely enough, didn't concern Turner.

The fans who paid \$45,839 to see what was expected to be a corking good fight went home wearing clothespins on their noses. To be brutally frank, the fight smelled out the joint. They were asking, "What happened to Dykes?"

Bobby, who hails from both Miami, Fla., and San Antonio, Tex.—take your choice—was a fighter without any fight. After winning the first two rounds, he might as well have gone home for the night. Turner used the would-be middleweight for a punching bag. One judge and the referee gave Turner the nod 7-2-1, while the other judge marked it 6-3-1. The Associated Press saw it 8-2.

Dallas 53, Woodburn 48

This gave Dallas undisputed claim to second place. The Dragons had been tied with Woodburn for the No. 2 spot before the game. The game was close all the way, with Dallas holding a slim 22-20 margin at halftime. Herb Brandt led Dallas in scoring with 13 points. Bob Withers of Woodburn was top scorer of the game with 18. Dallas' B team won the preliminary, 49-40.

Kid Gavilan Faces Cardell

Washington (AP)—Welterweight champion Kid Gavilan, a solid 4-1 favorite, continues to tune up for his Feb. 11 title bout when he meets Vic Cardell, Hartford, Conn., champion, in a non-title televised 10-rounder Wednesday night at Uline Arena.

Making his second start of the year in preparation for his title defense against Chuck Davey at Chicago Stadium next month, Gavilan is expected to be at near-peak condition against the 25-year-old Cardell.

Oregon Tech Wins 2nd Straight Over EOCE

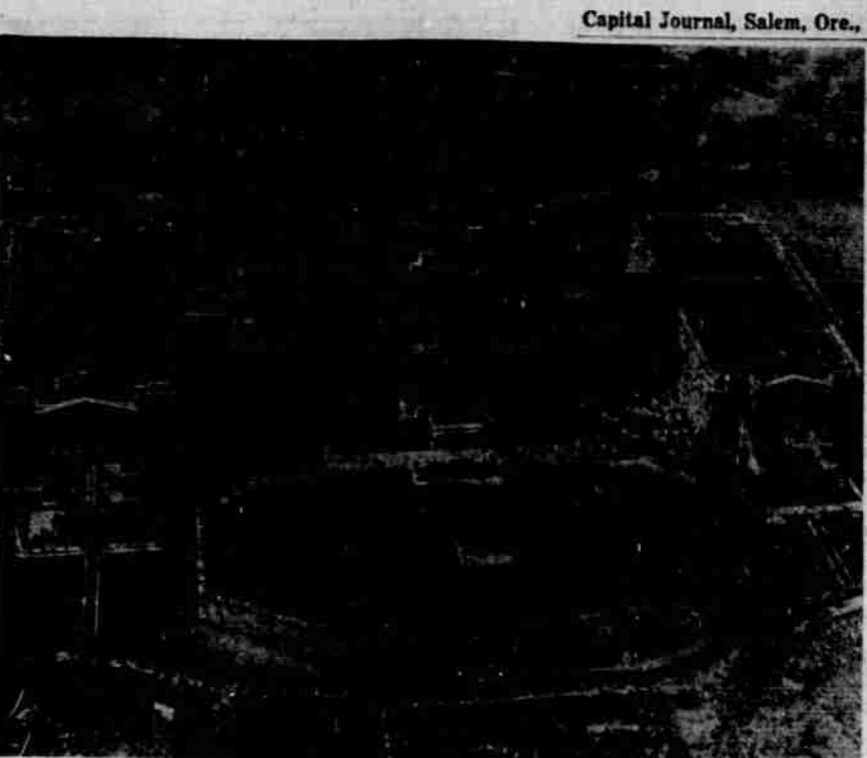

AFTER MILITARY SUCCESS, WHAT? Ike Undertakes New Life At Beginning of His Old Age

Washington (AP)—Gen. Eisenhower in later years may look back upon his life up till noon Tuesday as almost carefree when compared with what lies ahead.

His whole life had been a preparation for military eminence. He attained it. If he had retired from military life his place in history would be unquestioned.

It would have been military history, of course. Any fault found with him in that field, such as in tactics or strategy, would have been a minor footnote in the fat volume of his achievements.

His was military success on the grand scale. But the affection he won from a grateful nation was for more than just his victories in battle.

In his appearance he represented the military side of democracy at its best: He was a warm, earnest, smiling man. On the most solemn occasions he seemed as friendly and familiar as the man next door.

But by the very nature of his military life; and of the position of a military man in a republic, there was always someone above him to give final approval, or the final order, for a decision he made.

When he was a lieutenant, it was the captain; when he was a general or chief of staff, it was the President. Someone until now always stood between him and the final critical judgment of history on whatever he did.

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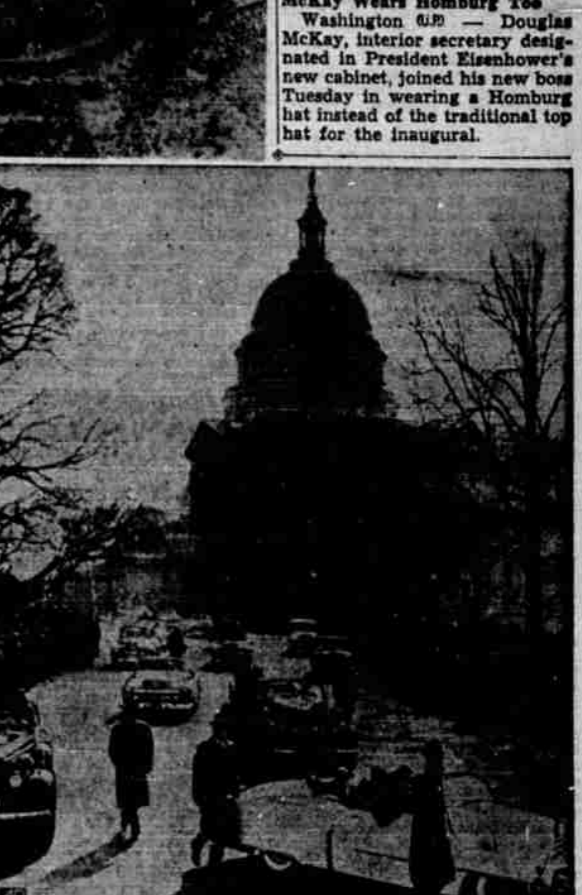

Casualties in 5-Hour Parade

Washington (AP)—Two deaths and approximately 200 other casualties were listed Wednesday in the wake of the five-hour inaugural parade.

The dead:
Lee F. Farmer, 52, member of the Long Beach, Calif., mounted sheriff's posse, found dead, apparently of a heart attack, in his Pullman berth Tuesday night.
Vincent Bovello, 56, Washington, who died Tuesday night in a hospital, apparently from a stroke. He collapsed while watching the parade.
The inaugural medical aid committee reported 200 bystanders collapsed from fatigue along the parade route.

McKay Wears Homburg Too
