Silverton—Immanuel Lutheran congregation held its annual meeting Wednesday evening, Rev. A. W. Nelson as chairman of the group, presided. Reports showed that church membership had increased and that attendance at worship service and at communion was larger than that of the past year. The financial secretary reported receipts for all purposes as being \$18,860.26 for 1952. For the coming year the congregation approved a budget of \$16,821.50, of which \$13,734 will be for local purposes and \$3,187.50 for benevolences. \$10 Million in Bids Coming up

The Highway Commission will receive bids on 28 highway construction projects estimated to cost about 10 million dollars at its meeting in Portland, January 21-22. This is the largest contract letting in terms of money ever to be offered for bids since the inception of the commission. The meetings will convene at the Benson Hotel, at 9 a.m. each day. Approximately \$4,600,000 of the total of \$10,100,000 represents bond financed projects.

Sewer Plant Bids Sought

Lebanon — Bids are being sought this week for construction of a sewage disposal plant here this summer. Bidders have until 8 p.m., March 3 to submit completed forms. They will be opened at that time. The work consists of construction of a 60-foot diameter primary aerator clarifier, control building with raw sewage pumps, and sludge beds, each 25 by 100 feet. In addition there will be 1465 feet of 27-inch concrete pipe line interceptor, and 1510 feet of 30-inch concrete pipe line outfall.

The construction site is located just east of the paper mill on five acres of ground given to the city for this project by Crown Zellerbach paper mill. The outlet pipe will pass through property owned by Ace Baker, who likewise made it available to the city at no cost.

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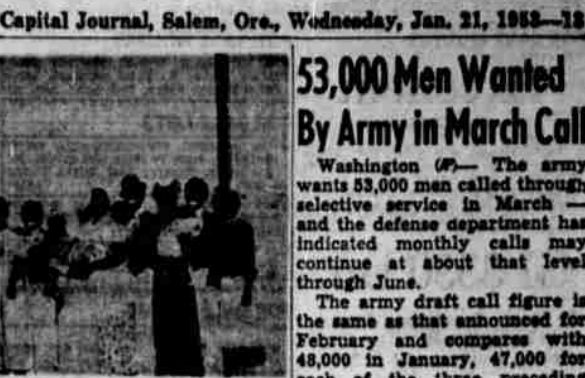
