Golden-brown Fish Fillets
Broccoli with Butter Sauce

Maple Fig Stuffed Apples

Maple Fig Stuffed Apples

Ingredients: 4 medium to large-size baking apples, 4 large table figs, 1/2 cup maple-blended syrup, 1/4 cup water, dash of salt.

Method: Wash and core apples all the way through; pare around stem end to remove a one-inch band of skin. Place apples in deep 2-quart casserole. Rinse figs in hot water and clip off stems; cut each one into small pieces and stuff into apple core cavity. Mix together the maple-blended syrup, water and salt; pour over apples. Cover and bake in moderate (375 degree F) oven 35 to 40 minutes, or until tender. Remove from oven and as apples cool keep spooning syrup in bottom of baking dish over them. Serve warm or cool with remaining syrup. Makes 4 servings.

Washington, D. C. (Special)—Dear Marian:

Oregonians who came to Washington prepared for any kind of weather from icy rain to snow have been delightfully surprised by the balmy days and lovely evenings. Of course, the republicans believe that it is because they lived right that such good fortune in weather has attended the inaugural festivities.

Today was the great day, of course, and your wire services covered in detail the ceremony and parade.

Suffice for me to say that the ceremony was the most impressive moment of many great events witnessed over a period of years. I think that those of you at home who heard on the radio or on television the beautifully worded prayer of deep humility and sincerity given by President Eisenhower at the opening of his address will know that we too, were emotionally affected. Even the men were surreptitiously wiping their eyes, while beautiful feminine white handkerchiefs blossomed out of purses on all sides.

The Governor Pattersons and Bill and Edna Phillips have been housed at Hotel 2400, next door to my apartment house, and this morning Bill, Edna and I followed the Pattersons open car out to the capitol, blessing the beautiful day that made an open car appropriate. The Governor and Mrs. Patterson were a handsome couple in the procession of governors' cars in the parade this afternoon. Riding with them was Commander W. G. Smith, of the Potomac River Naval Command, who was assigned as an aide to the governor, and who has been a great "fixer" for all of us.

Events and highlights have so crowded the days only briefly can they be covered in this first letter. On Sunday the principal functions began with a governor's reception—some 5000 people massing into the Statler hotel for one of the friendliest large receptions on could imagine.

Around the room were designated areas in which the various governors and their wives received. We were all proud of our governor's wife, Mrs. Paul L. Patterson, who enjoyed the informal greetings of some friends from the Northwest and of new acquaintances. She wore a Dresden blue crepe cocktail dress with beaded neckline. Her pink hat and pink carnation corsage complimented the gown.

Wives of the cabinet members came in for special attention at the reception and Mrs. Douglas McKay was continuously sought out by the guests. In a two piece cocktail suit of black lace over pink, with a pink lacquered straw hat, she was a handsome addition to the line.
