Prep Teams Busy Tonight

Salem Plays Albany Here; 14 Other Games in Area

Albany high school's tall and potent Bulldogs invade the Salem high school gymnasium to do battle with the sinking Salem Vikings, who have suffered four straight losses.

The Albany-Salem mix is set for 8:15, following a game between the Salem Sophs and Albany Jayvees at 6:30.

Elsewhere around the mid-Willamette valley, other high school teams will be busy engaged in league and non-league play.

In non-leaguers, Salem Academy of the Capitol league plays Gervais of the Marion county B league at Gervais, and Stayton, Capitol league champions, meet Central at Central.

Dallas will be seeking to clinch the Willamette Valley league championship tonight in a game against Woodburn at Dallas. The Dragons are already assured of at least a tie for the crown. In other WVL games tonight, Mt. Angel goes to Sandy, Silverton to Estacada and Molalla at Canby.

In the same situation as Dallas, that is, having clinched a tie and seeking a clinch of the crown, is Mill City in the Marion county B league. All Mill City needs to do to win the championship is to defeat Sub-

limity tonight. Sublimity is in second place with a 12-2 mark. Mill City has won 14 straight games in loop play.

(By The Associated Press) Willamette University and Whitman moved up in Northwest Conference basketball standings after victories over College of Idaho and Linfield.

Willamette edged College of Idaho 72-71 at Caldwell and replaced the Idaho team in second place behind idle Lewis and Clark. Whitman's 77-66 victory

over Linfield tied the Missionaries with the Idaho five in third place.

Jim Henslee, a substitute forward, put Willamette in the win column with a field goal with only 15 seconds remaining. After a see-saw first quarter, College of Idaho led until Henslee connected with his two-pointer.

Whitman also came from behind for its third straight conference win at Walla Walla. Linfield led 32-30 at halftime, but Whitman pulled ahead in the third and fourth quarters and was out in front 60-44 midway of the final period.

Leading scorers in the two games were R. C. Owens of College of Idaho, 23 points; Dick Fain of Whitman, 18; Pete Reed of Willamette 17, and Grant Schiewe of Linfield, 12.

Archie Moore Wins by KO

San Francisco (AP)—Archie Moore, TKO'd Leonard Dugan of Oakland, Calif., in the eighth round of a scheduled 10-rounder Monday night.

Moore, a prohibitive favorite, held an edge through aggressiveness all the way. After a flurry of rights and lefts to the jaw dropped Dugan for a 9-count, referee Jack Downey halted the fight at 1:12 of the eighth.

Moore weighed 175 pounds. Dugan, a 6-foot-4 Negro with only five pro fights, weighed 290.

Cribbing Scandal Shakes William and Mary College

Williamsburg, Va. (AP)—The aged college of William and Mary faced a major athletic re-structuring Tuesday in the wake of the nation's worst cribbing scandal since the explosion of 99 West Point cadets in 1951.

At least a dozen athletes, including first string football and basketball players, were among an estimated 30 to 35 students dropped from the William and Mary rolls for violating the school's honor code.

College officials, beyond admitting that infractions of the honor system had occurred, maintained a tight-lipped policy and declined comment. They withheld names of those involved.

It was the second big scandal to shake William and Mary, the nation's second oldest college, within a year and a half.

In August, 1951, there was a resounding athletic and administrative shakedown following disclosure that some athletes had been given undeserved grades and the transcripts of promising high school stars had been altered to make them eligible for

college sports. The basketball team lost five varsity players — two starters and the others front-line reserves.

The football team suffered the loss of next season's co-captains.

Caplanos and Seattle Enter Into Agreement

Vancouver, B.C. (AP)—The Vancouver Caplanos of the Western International League and the Seattle Rainiers of the Pacific Coast League have signed a working agreement for the 1953 baseball season, Dewey Soriano said Monday.

Soriano, Vancouver manager, said the agreement takes the place of a verbal arrangement the two clubs had in past years. It gives the Caplanos first choice of players and the Rainiers a club in a league of lower classification than the PCL.

NIT Bags LaSalle, Looks Around for Other Top Teams

New York (AP)—Having bagged LaSalle, the defending champion and fourth ranking team in the country, the National Invitation basketball tournament promoters Tuesday set their sights on three other top drawing cards—Seton Hall, Seattle and Western Kentucky.

The NIT, in signing the Explorers, thus won the first round in its battle with the NCAA to attract the best teams in the country. In past years, a school could play in both, but this time the NCAA decreed one or the other.

The NCAA wanted LaSalle, so the choice was left to the members of the team, who decided they would prefer the NIT because it was close to their Philadelphia home. They did not like the travel involved in the NCAA tourna-

ment. Both Seton Hall and Niagara definitely have received feelers for the NIT, and the feeling is that Seton Hall, the only major undefeated team in the country, will accept for the same reason as LaSalle.

There are 23 teams in the NCAA tournament including 14 conference champions, who might or might not be of top drawer calibre. Milltating against the NCAA is the fact that some of the crack outfits would get in as "at large" teams, meaning they are not members of a conference, and would have to play a preliminary contest.

Seton Hall, Niagara and LaSalle all fall in this category, and would be running the risk of being whipped before the tournament even started.
