

## Government Bond Sales For January Reported

Sales of government defense bonds in Marion county during January totaled \$123,476. Of these \$121,256 were in E and H bonds and \$2220 in J and K bonds.

Total January sales in Polk county were \$30,642, in Linn \$70,618 and in Yamhill \$33,361.

Purchases of series E and H defense bonds throughout Oregon during January jumped 3 1/2 per cent over January of last year, according to Bruce Williams county defense bond chairman.

State-wide sales of the E and H defense bonds amounted to \$2,542,464, while county sales totaled \$121,256. An additional \$513,328 in series J and K defense bonds were also sold during January throughout the state.

Williams stated that the total state sales fell three million dollars short of the assigned January sales objective.

"The good increase does reflect, however, an upward swing in purchases, and our volunteer sales organization is optimistic regarding an acceleration in purchases during the year that will enable us to make our goal of \$45 million \$90 thousand," he said.

Across the nation defense bond sales jumped 14 per cent, while redemptions of matured and unmatured defense bonds dropped 12 per cent over January of last year. A little over one-half billion dollars in all series defense bonds were purchased toward the national goal of \$5 billion \$50 million.

Williams urged all county residents to save a portion of their income this year in defense bonds.

"Our government has assigned us a goal to meet, and the fulfillment of this goal will go a long way toward helping the new administration in its fight to strengthen the purchasing power of our dollar and end inflationary pressures against everyone's pocketbook," he said. "We can materially assist our country, as well as ourselves and our families, by purchasing defense bonds regularly where we work or where we bank."

## Bulb District Escapes Floods

Holland's bulb district escaped the floods that did so much damage in that country the first of February so the world will still be having flowers from Holland.

"That information was received by Paul and Helen Heath this week from the Boot family which has a bulb farm at Sassemheim, Holland.

The letter to the Heaths commented: "Undoubtedly you will have heard and read in the newspapers about the terrible floods we had in Holland the night of Sunday, February 1. For people in the flooded areas it must have looked as if doomsday had come. Thousands of our countrymen, women and children spent two or three days and nights on the roof of their homes or in the tops of trees, under the most miserable conditions and bitterly cold."

"This terrible disaster, of course, made a deep impression on all of us. Our nation as one man did what was humanly possible, to help those who suffered. In days of need it is a very great pleasure to meet friends who are willing to help. The fellowship and spontaneous assistance from four foreign countries, particularly from the American army, is highly appreciated by the Dutch people. We are very grateful indeed that our Allies showed to be good friends in need."

The letter went on to say that at the time it was written the country's industrial works were still 100 per cent intact and the farm area 75 per cent and that if there was no further disasters the damage done would "be altered within a couple of years."

Moscow (AP)—Moscow's Literary Gazette accused the Israeli government Tuesday of carrying on a policy of race discrimination and of establishing special "ghettos" for Arabs, mod-

eled after those set up by Hitler for European Jews.

The bitter attack, latest in a series of major Soviet blasts at Israeli leaders and Zionism, came five days after the Kremlin severed diplomatic relations with the Tel Aviv government as a result of the bombing of the Soviet legation in the Jewish capital.

## Woodworkers Scale Rejected

Portland (AP)—CIO International Woodworkers neared the end of preliminary talks today with big employer groups in the Pacific Northwest — and so far the union proposals have been rejected at all points.

Basic contract changes asked by regional union negotiators at a series of scattered meetings call for a six-hour work day and pay increase of 30 cents an hour.

Employer representatives turned that down at Portland, Klamath Falls and Coos Bay meetings. At Portland the Lumber Industrial Relations Committee proposed, for operators, to renew current contracts with no more than minor changes. At Klamath Falls, the Pine Industrial Relations Committee made a similar proposal. The Pine Industrial Relations Committee made a similar proposal. The union rejected both, but set Feb. 24 for renewal of talks at Portland. No date was set for the pine region interests to get together again.
