Annexation at Lebanon Urged

Lebanon — Annexation of three suburban additions, Morgan, Ingrid and McKinney, to the city was outlined at this week's council meeting by spokesmen from the areas. A move to include these sections along with Strawberry subdivision in the corporate limits of the city was brought to a vote in 1949.

Both Morgan and Ingrid voters approved the move, but Strawberry voters cast a large enough dissenting vote to defeat the proposal.

Spokesmen said residents of Morgan and Ingrid additions are seeking a solution to drainage and sanitary problems.

Hope was expressed that action could be taken that would coordinate with the building of the city's sewage disposal plant slated for construction later this summer.

At the present time both the Morgan and Ingrid subdivisions, as well as the Strawberry area, have no sewage system. The heavily populated residence areas are served mainly by outdoor toilets and some septic tanks. There is no existing drainage system for storm waters.

The council indicated that full cooperation would be offered any plan that might be advanced for annexation. The street committee was named to meet with spokesmen from the areas to discuss such plans.
