Peg in Washington

Washington, D.C.—

Dear Marlas: Mrs. Douglas McKay, wife of the Secretary of the Interior, was a thrilled witness of the memorial service on Lincoln's birthday when wreaths were placed at the base of the magnificent 19-foot statue of Lincoln.

President Dwight D. Eisenhower set aside precedent, as he has on other occasions, and walked up the long flight of steps ahead of his aides carrying his huge wreath, rather than remaining at the foot of the steps as recent Presidents have done. He was serious faced and solemn in demeanor but acknowledged the audience when he reached the bottom of the flight. The first wreath placed was that of the Secretary of the Interior, and Secretary McKay advanced up the steps accompanied by representatives of military organizations, including the Legion of Honor. The Memorial area is a national park and under the supervision of the Interior Department and Mr. McKay followed custom in offering his tribute, too. Twenty wreaths were placed by the organizations. There were no speeches but the Gettysburg address was read and the Marine Band played for the audience of some 1,000 persons.

Life magazine photographers have been busy about the Department at various times during the week, taking a series of pictures that will appear in the issue that will be on newsstands on February 26, according to present plans. The Secretary is to be featured and the activities of the Department outlined.

On behalf of Capital Post No. 9, of the American Legion, Salem, a beautiful olynx base pen set was presented to Mr. McKay on Monday. Presentation was made by Archie Loveland and Vic MacKensie, members of Capital Post, and Senator Gordon aided in the brief ceremony. Archie, who is now manager of El Rancho Vegas at Las Vegas, formerly conducted a dance orchestra in Portland. While he has never attended a meeting of Capital Post, he keeps up his membership through the years.

On top of that, the hearings were then postponed but two other Congressional committees called for the Secretary to appear on appropriations and Hawaiian statehood and, of course, at times when again the calendars were loaded.

Again I must clear the slate. I am about to order some ink that takes for appointments as my calendar is hard to decipher with all these changes. After all, it's just a part of the Washington picture, I should add nonchalantly.
