

Sunday School Group to Meet

"Every Teacher an Evangelist" will be the theme of the 54th annual convention of the Marion County Sunday School association which will convene Saturday at 9:30 a.m. in the buildings of Salem academy.

Rev. Henry Turnidge, president of the academy, will open the morning session with a devotional period after which the assembly will divide into workshop discussion groups centering on the themes: "Purposeful Preparation," "Purposeful Administration," and "Purposeful Participation." A nursery will be provided for the small children of those attending.

Mrs. John Hinkle, Portland, supervisor of Sunday school teacher training classes for over 20 years, will give a demonstration of visual aids to the entire group during the last hour of the morning session. A no-host lunch will be held at noon.

In the afternoon the convention will be addressed by Dr. H. W. Byrne, professor of philosophy and Christian education at Western Evangelical seminary in Portland, on the theme, "The Evangelistic Challenge of the Sunday School." Dr. Byrne has spent 10 years in the pastorate and completed his doctorate in education at Bradley university in Peoria, Ill.

Bible Words to Live by

The text that I prefer is found in the first epistle of St. John, the second chapter, at the 16th verse:

"For all that is in the world, the lust of the flesh, and the lust of the eyes, and the pride of life, is not of the Father, but is of the world. And the world passeth away, and the lust thereof; but he that doeth the will of God abideth forever."

On a hill called Roundtop overlooking the Connecticut River, at East Northfield, Massachusetts, the final words in this text are the inscription on the tomb of Dwight Moody, that powerful religious force who was not only an evangelist of international repute, but the founder of the Northfield Schools. The verse first struck me when I saw this tomb. Ever since, with the development of events in history in this century, it has seemed to me a warning against the this-worldly point of view which has characterized our modern materialistic epoch. Have we not estimated success and the good life in terms of what we call "the American standard of living?" By advertising and every other means the lust of the eyes and the pride of life have been accentuated. The lust of the flesh has become undisciplined and uncriticized as in the loosest of past centuries. And yet our world has been up against, as never before, the sense of the impermanence and precariousness of its whole present organization. This text drives us to consider the things that abide forever.

More important is that a person abides forever, who, like Abraham Lincoln or General Lee, or John Wesley or thousands of others in humbler ways seeks to do the will of God. In the midst of modern uncertainty and frustration it is well for people to know that in all their choices there is an eternal significance in choosing the will of God. Jesus' life, death and resurrection is the supreme instance of this faith, and indeed the source of it.
