Viks Win Big 6 Mat Title

The Salem high Vikings captured the Big Six League wrestling tournament here Friday night for the second straight year. The two day tourney saw the Vikings, coached by Hank Juran, rack up 57 points.

The runnerup was the Springfield Millers who came through with 33 points. Bend was third with 21 points, and the Corvallis Spartans had six. Salem had six winners in the twelve weights, Springfield had three, Bend two, and Corvallis one.

Springfield's Joe Willis defeated his teammate Joe Keasey for the title in the 98 pound class in a very close match. The score was 3-1. Willis earlier in the two day meet wracked up wins over Mel Williams, Corvallis, and Courtney Jacobs, Salem.

The Vikings' Roger Morse won the 106 pound championship by defeating Sam Humbert of Bend. He drew a first round bye but defeated Bend's Merv Hoefs Thursday in the semi-finals.

In a match between two Salem wrestlers Fay Ladd defeated Jerry Boose. Ladd had a first round bye and defeated Darrel Dodson of Springfield in the semi-finals the day before yesterday.

Bob Engle, Salem, captured the 123 pound league title by pinning Don Phillips, also of Salem, late in the second round. Engle also won a championship last year in the same meet. He defeated Mel Hollister earlier in this meet after receiving a first round bye.

The 130 pound title was taken by Frank Williams of Salem who defeated his fellow teammate, Bob Cameron. Williams pinned Dick Fountain of the Millers in the opening round and defeated Roy Mintken of the Corvallis Spartans in the semi-final round.

Pat Largent, Salem, pinned Roger Ostrander, Springfield, for the championship of the league's 136 pounders. Largent defeated Dick Allen, Corvallis, and planned Darwin Saxon, Springfield, in earlier matches.
