S.H.A. trailed throughout the entire game, but it was a thirty foot push shot by Vance Cooney that tied up the crucial Card-Cougar tilt at 54 all.

The game started as Cascade jumped into a quick 5 point lead, and by the quarter were leading the Cardinals 15-8. The sharpshooting Cougars stretched their lead to a 13 point margin at the half and it seemed that the Cards just couldn't get going.

The second half of the Capitol feature was a different game. The Cards started to move, and with deadly accuracy, closed the gap to six points, going into the fourth heat. Leo Grosjaques' gang fought point for point and slowly gained, then with five

seconds left, Vance Cooney swished one, to send the game into an overtime.
