Maxim Hammers 10-Round Win Over Danny Nardico

Miami, Fla. (AP)—Joey Maxim, the fancy master of the left jab, was back in the boxing business today after winning a unanimous 10-round decision over the young Tampa slugger Danny Nardico.

They said Pal Joey was all washed up after Archie Moore slapped off his light heavyweight crown in St. Louis Dec. 17. And many fans doubted the 30-year-old Maxim's ability to handle Nardico.

But Joey, a bit plump around the middle at 183½ pounds, stood off the charging Nardico with ease in Miami stadium last night, although he had a scramble off the deck in the seventh when Nardico caught him with a right to the head. Nardico weighed 176½.

The ex-champ's manager, Jack Kearns, declared after the fight that Joey not only was back on the right track but planned to go after Rocky Marciano's heavyweight championship.

"We'll fight Roland Lasterza first if necessary," Kearns asserted, "but Marciano's the one we want." Asked about the contract giving Maxim a return fight with Moore, Kearns said, "We'll take Moore when the right time comes."

Jim Norris, International Boxing Club president, tossed cold water on the idea of Maxim campaigning in the heavyweight ranks. Norris said:

"I don't know that Lasterza wants Maxim. He's in good shape after his win over Rex Layne. And I don't think it would be fair to let Maxim have Marciano and keep Lasterza, Layne and Ezzard Charles waiting."

Maxim was more of a fighter than he has been in a long time as he pounded the 25-year-old Nardico's face with his left and threw his right hand in a surprisingly effective fashion. He piled up a big early lead while making Nardico miss badly with his long right swings.

Eugene Team Wins AAU Title; Salem Fourth

Central Point (AP)—The Eugene entry, Everybody's Drug, captured the Oregon AAU basketball championship here Wednesday night with a 60-41 win over Philco team of Portland.

A tight defense throttled the Portlanders, while Paul Sowers, former University of Oregon long-shot expert, led Eugene to the win with 23 points.

Reedy Berg, another former Oregon player, topped the Portlanders with 9 points.

Third place in the tournament went to West Side Tavern of Bend in a 80-64 conquest of Wolgamoti of Salem. Forward Delano Fox dropped in 23 points for Bend. Salem's high was 17 points by Larry Chamberlain.

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Selvy, O'Brien Dukes May Set New Hoop Marks

New York (AP)—Individual scoring records are about to fall in several directions in major college basketball, NCAA Service Bureau statistics indicated Thursday, with Furman's Frank Selvy, Seattle's Johnny O'Brien and Seton Hall's Walter Dukes the ones who will push them over.

Selvy, strongly entrenched above the point-making standings with an average of 29.3 a game, starts play Thursday in the Southern Conference championship tournament with his sights set on the record of 29.2, set two years ago by Bill Mikvy of Temple.

O'Brien, who has averaged 27.8, and Dukes, who has 28.4, are aiming at Dick Groat's total of 831 points in one season which the Duke star compiled last year. O'Brien, with two regular-season games and at least one NCAA contest ahead of him, has 751. Dukes, with a maximum of three games and a minimum of one in the National Invitation tournament remaining, has 791.

In fourth place is Pennsylvania's Ernie Beck, with 28.0, two regular-season games to go and, if the Quakers hold their Ivy

lead, NCAA competition. Fifth, with 25.2 is Don Schlundt, whose Indiana team is already in the NCAA as the Big Ten champion. Bob Houbreks of Washington, who was fifth last week, slipped to eighth with a 24.4 average. He's also in the NCAA.

1952 NAIB Champs to Defend Title

Kansas City (AP)—The Springfield (Mo.) State Bears Wednesday night won the right in a district playoff to defend their national intercollegiate basketball championship in the six-day tournament here next week.

Springfield—officially Southwest Missouri State College—crushed Missouri Valley College, the Missouri College Athletic Union champion, 103-69, at Springfield.

The NAIA—National Association of Intercollegiate Athletics—opens its annual tournament in Municipal Auditorium Monday.
