Date Nut Graham Cracker Squares Beverage

Date Nut Graham Cracker Squares
Ingredients: 1 1/2 cups finely crushed graham cracker crumbs, 1 1/2 teaspoons baking powder, 1/2 teaspoon salt, 1 cup (lightly packed) chopped pitted dates, 1 cup chopped walnuts, 1 cup firmly packed dark brown sugar, 3 tablespoons butter or margarine (melted), 1/4 cup confectioners' sugar.

Method: Stir graham cracker crumbs, baking powder, and salt together. Stir in dates and nuts, separating pieces of date with fingers if necessary. Beat eggs with rotary beater until thick and lemon-colored; gradually beat in brown sugar, then melted butter. Fold into graham cracker mixture until crumbs are moistened. Bake in well-greased 8-inch square pan in moderate (375F) oven 30 minutes or until cake tester inserted in center comes out clean. Place on cake rack and cool in pan. While still warm, cut into 16 generous squares. Put confectioners' sugar in paper bag. Shake each square in bag to coat with sugar.

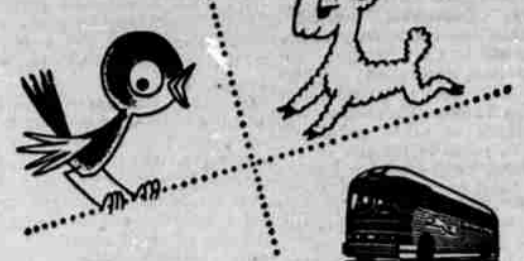
