

Archdiocesan Council of Catholic Women Meets

"Don't worry so much about paying bills, and devote at least some time at every meeting to helping extend the kingdom of Christ on earth, to problems of a troubled society and to the boys and girls."

This was the advice and the challenge given the women of the Archdiocesan Council of Catholic Women at the closing banquet session Sunday night in the Multnomah hotel in Portland, by the spiritual director, the Very Rev. Edmund J. Murnane, pastor of St. Mary's parish in Eugene.

Gov. Paul L. Patterson, who followed Father Murnane, referred to the theme as advised by the spiritual director "Extending the Kingdom of God on Earth" and told of his own very deeply moving sentiments at the inauguration of President Dwight Eisenhower when in sight and sound of millions of his fellow citizens the just inaugurated president prayed for divine guidance and help in the task before him.

All of the work of the convention, the advice from the state and archdiocesan leaders, was summed up by Archbishop Edward E. Howard in closing the 29th annual convention.

"Society will be just what we make it. Nothing is more powerful than public opinion which is molded by powerful media of radio, television, the home, the church, films, personal example, letter writing, and conversation," Archbishop Howard said.

Doctrine Extended

The confraternity of Christian doctrine, started many years ago in Portland archdiocese by the Rev. E. V. O'Hara then pastor of St. Mary's in Eugene and now Bishop in Kansas, is being reactivated in a larger way in the Portland area, and the work was presented to the convention delegates by Sister Mary Presentia, OSF, and Sister Mary Maurina, OSF, who are in charge of the work in Baker, Ore., diocese.

The very Rev. T. J. Bernards, former pastor of St. Joseph's in Salem and now at Oregon City, celebrated the mass the opening day at Marylhurst college where Saturday sessions were held.

Students of Marylhurst assisted at the convention Sat-

urday and students of Immaculata academy in Portland assisted at the meetings Sunday in the Multnomah hotel.

Supreme Court Justice Hall S. Lusk was one of the speakers at the Sunday afternoon symposium on the bishop's statement "Religion Our Most Valuable Asset." Justice Lusk spoke on the community role.

Dr. Thomas A. Kerns of Eugene spoke on "Man Needs Religion as an Individual." Mrs. Thomas J. Harold of Portland spoke on the "Family Need of Religion." The Rev. Martin Thielens, superintendent of Catholic schools in Portland, spoke of the "Role of Christian Faith."

Cheese Muffins
Sliced Pineapple Beverage

Cheese Muffins
Ingredients: 2 cups sifted flour, 3 teaspoons baking powder, 1/4 teaspoon salt, 2 tablespoons sugar, 1 cup very lightly packed grated cheddar cheese, 1 egg, 1 cup milk, 2 tablespoons butter or margarine (melted).

Method: Sift flour, baking powder, salt and sugar together. Stir in cheese. Beat egg until foamy; add milk and beat enough to combine; stir in melted butter. Add sifted dry ingredients; stir only until dry

ingredients are moistened. Fill greased muffin pans about two-thirds full. Bake in hot (425F) oven 20 to 25 minutes or until browned, and cake tester inserted in center of muffin comes out clean. Serve hot. Makes 12 medium-size muffins.
