The wife of W. J. (Dubs) Mulkey, Jr., said she located her husband at The Dalles after some 100 Lincoln county residents had started a search for him. The search was prompted after he failed to return home Thursday night from a lodge meeting at Toledo.

Mrs. Mulkey said her husband had agreed to meet her in Portland last night and would return to Newport.

She said he had been under a terrific strain for the last two months and had suffered a "kind of nervous breakdown." She did not elaborate on what had caused the strain.

Mulkey had been sergeant in charge of the Newport district state police for 18 years. He had suffered a heart attack a year ago, but had recovered and returned to work.

Mulkey formerly lived at Monmouth. As a State Police officer he was stationed in Salem for several years.
