Seek Expansion For MacLaren

Woodburn—A legislative appropriation of approximately \$132,000 for construction to expand present facilities and about \$25,000 for operational expenses will probably be sought for the MacLaren school for boys, according to word received here following a meeting of the Woodburn community committee with the state board of control during the week.

It was believed that there were no immediate prospects for an intermediate institution this session.

Six members of the local committee which is cooperating with school officials in working out problems of the school attended the board of control meeting. They asked some immediate community protection program until such time as a permanent solution of the problem could be found. During January and February approximately 220 boys were housed in facilities provided for 185.
