arrangements were still pend-ing today for Jim Thorpe, the big Indian who won sports fame that never dimmed during his lifetime, but who tast-ed bitter disappointment al-most from the moment he reached greatness.

Thorpe, 64, died Saturday of heart attack in his trailer home here, where he had come just a week earlier to rest and fish. He and his wife, Patricia, eating dinner at the time.
