Willamina — The annual Easter Sunrise Service sponsored by the Willamina Ministerial association will be held again this year, it has been announced by the Rev. Emil Howell, president of the association.

Mayor Frank Smelser announced that each department of the city will give complete financial reports each month from now on. He also announced that the budget committee would be appointed at the next meeting to begin studying the financial problems of the city.

It was voted by the council to set up a complete set of books for the water department beginning April 1, and that the records be kept separate from the rest of the departments.

Leota Noreen, city treasurer, will be water clerk, and will be paid \$150 a month to keep the water books. The water meters will be read on April 1, and the first bills for metered water will be sent out on May 1.

The bid of the E and G motor company was accepted for six new tires for one of the fire trucks.

Don Cunliffe, head of the Willamina Civil Defense organization, has announced that Willamina's application to the federal government for a fire truck and a walkie-talkie has been accepted. Formal application for a new truck, which will cost \$13,000 will be made.

The Class A fire truck will have a 200 HP motor and pump capable of pumping 750 gallons of water a minute against 150 pounds pressure. As neither Sheridan or Willamina have a Class A piece of equipment, the addition of such a truck to the local equipment would decrease fire insurance rates.

The Doyle Lumber company of Grand Ronde, owned by Joe Doyle of Willamina, has been sold to Elton Hokanson of McMinnville. He will start the mill as soon as the weather is favorable.

Mr. Doyle will devote all his time to the Doyle Cable Cutter, which he designed and now has put on the market. He has received a certificate from the State Industrial Accident Prevention division in approval of the cutter.

Awarded Medal

Clothing Allowance
Air Force reservists falling into two categories will soon be entitled to a new uniform clothing allowance ranging from \$50 to \$100.

In the first category are those for active duty allowances. This will be paid officers who entered active duty or active duty for training for more than 90 days (on or before June 26, 1950) when two years elapsed between periods of active duty. These officers will receive a maximum of \$100.

Not eligible are those officers whose service within the previous two years was as a regular Air Force officer or any officer who received an initial uniform allowance of more than \$200 during this current tour of duty.

All Air Force reserve officers will be entitled to maintenance allowance not to exceed \$50 for each four years of satisfactory service in an active status in the same reserve component. This four year period must include 25 days of active duty or active duty training. Periods of extended active duty in excess of 90 days cannot be counted toward four years of eligibility. The four year period may have started before June 9, 1952, but must have been completed after that date.

Payments of active duty and maintenance allowance may be made to reserve officer no longer maintained at military status, if they meet the requirements.

Application is made through the reserve unit to which they are the reservist is assigned. If he is still with the reserve, and if not, through the nearest volunteer Air Reserve unit.
