"Although the program is not yet outlined," Arn said, "it's purpose would be to get down and tell what Americanism really means." ism really means."


Arn said the foundation al-ready has spent \$130,000 on the Abilene museum building which should be finished within the next two months, but needs \$90,000 to complete it.
