

## Representative Helps Solon Gain Entry to U.S.

Connie Peres, Salem Senator home-run specialist who has been stranded in Cuba with passport difficulties for weeks, will be on his way to the Pacific coast in a matter of hours, thanks to an assist from U. S. Representative Walter Norblad.

Norblad, who had been called in the play by Salem Senators president Bruce Williams, yesterday contacted officials of the State department in Washington, and the State department oked Peres's entry into the United States.

Peres will fly to San Francisco, and from there may go to the Salem Senators spring camp at Calistoga, about 70 miles from San Francisco, or he may come directly to Salem, since the Senator team is due to drive home Thursday.
