

Another Two-Hitter Tossed In Pacific Coast League

 San Francisco (AP) — Two hitters are getting almost as common in the Pacific Coast League as two-buck betters at your nearest horse parlor.

Eddie Chandler of the Los Angeles Angels was the latest hurler to join that once-exclusive circle last night when he set Hollywood down with a brace of hits and also shoved them out of first place. The Angels took over sole possession of the top spot by virtue of their 3-1 victory over the Twinks.

And that makes the fourth two-hit ball game racked up in the PCL in only the third week of the race. Others who have spun near masterpieces are Al Gettel of Oakland, Roger Osenbaugh of Sacramento and Mel Queen of Hollywood. Mel registered his against the Seraphs on Tuesday.

In other games, the improved Sacramento Solons downed Seattle for the second straight time, 5-4, and San Francisco outlasted Oakland, 11 to 10, in an 11-inning scramble that left the Acorns all alone in the cellar. San Diego and Portland sat this one out, having played their regularly scheduled contest as part of double header on Tuesday.

Tom Saffell touched Chandler for a single in the first inning and then the strong right-hander set down the next 22 Hollywood batters. Gene Handley of the Stars broke the spell with a single in the eighth and scored on a fly by Eddie Malone.

Sacramento blasted four runs across the plate in the ninth to plummet the Rainiers down to third place. Trailing 4-1 in that frame, the Solons got started when Eddie Bockman worked Steve Nagy for a pass.

The Seals took their third straight from Oakland by scoring an unearned run in the top of the eleventh just as the scorekeepers had sent out for more blanks.
