Air Reservists Go to Seattle

Naval Air reservists, starting their two weeks of active duty training at the Salem Naval Air Facility Monday, left late Monday morning for Seattle, where they will spend the first few days of their cruise.

In the group, which made the trip north in planes from the Salem installation, were both officers and enlisted men. They will return here the latter part of the week for flight training and classes.

During the week-end the Salem facility had several planes here from other military installations. Coming in from Seattle were two F6Fs from the Seattle Naval Air Station. Piloting one of those planes was Lt. Ralph Valentine, Salem, member of the Naval Air Reserve squadron AAU 891 here, who is now on six weeks of operational training duty in Seattle.

Five planes came in from California Saturday night and left here on the return trip Sunday. Four of the planes were Navy ADs piloted by regular Navy pilots, based in Southern California. The other plane from California was an F6F with a Marine as pilot.

Pacific Northwest's Business Still Good

Seattle, (AP)—Two good business guides, freight carloading and planned new construction, show the Pacific Northwest still enjoys "good times."

Freight carloadings, the Pacific Northwest Advisory Board reports, were the largest the first three months this year of any first-quarter since 1948, with heavy movement of forest products contributing to the upswing.

Furthermore, the value of new construction authorized in March in the Northwest states, Montana, Wyoming and Utah was 35 per cent above the total for the same month last year, Construction News Bulletin, Seattle building trade journal, said Saturday.

Weather Increases Operations at Field

Springtime is apparently flying time from the number of operations at McNary field over the past week-end. Total operations for the two days was 493, with Sunday having the biggest number, 353. Saturday figures were 340.

On both days Navy aircraft had the largest number of operations. Sunday figures for the Navy were 94 locals and 38 itinerant and on Saturday the operations were 66 locals and 24 itinerant.

Other operations for the two days with Sunday listed first were: air carriers, 10 both days; Air Force itinerant 24 and 8; civilian itinerant, 39 and 36; Air Force local, two and 14; and civilian local, 46 and 62.

Commendation Ribbon to Cpl. Noack

With IX Corps in Korea — Cpl. Melvin I. Noack, 1350 Hoffman road, Salem in March of this year was awarded the Commendation ribbon for meritorious service with the 461st infantry battalion in Korea.

The citation accompanying the ribbon was for the period from June 18, 1952, to March 10, 1953, and stated that:

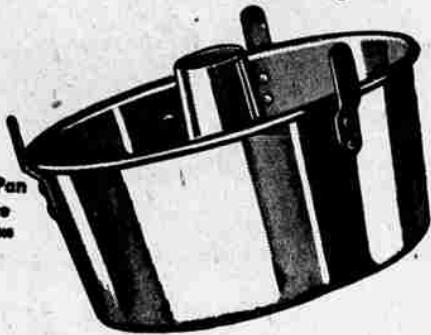

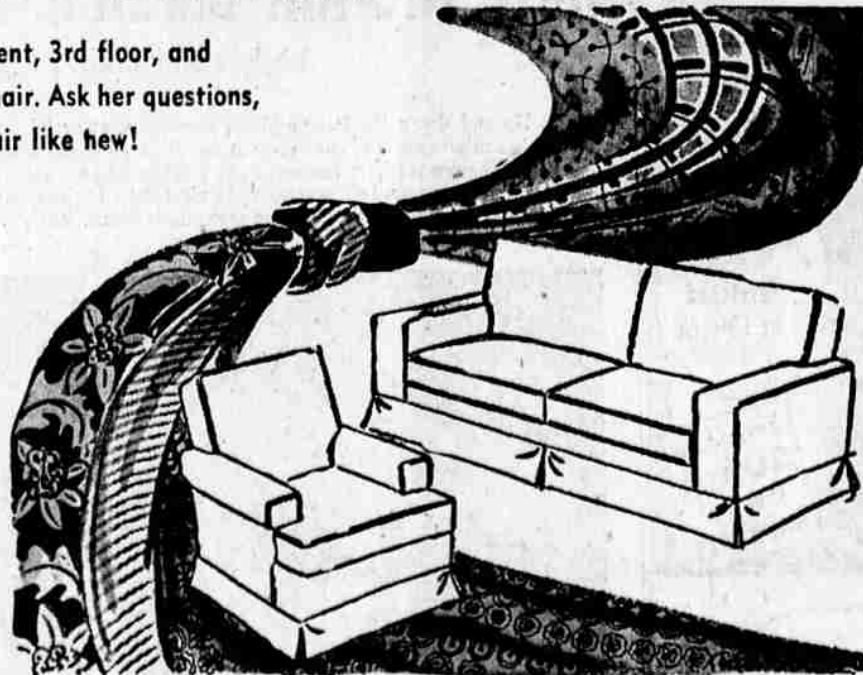
