## Replanting of Tillamook Burn

Five million two-year-old Douglas fir seedlings will be hard planted in the Tillamook burn during the next six months, while 10,000 acres will be aerial seeded if the seed can be obtained, Rudy Kallander, rehabilitation director of the State Forestry Department, said Friday. Contracts will be awarded

May 8 for cutting snags on 1,300 acres of the Trask area of the burn.


