Voters Asked

(Continued from Page 1) In the house rejecting the senate's action in approving an increase in legislative pay for the present session, the legislature in its closing days adopted a resolution referring a proposed constitutional amendment to the voters permitting the legislature to set its own pay. Much complaint was heard from members of the legislature that the present legislative pay of \$800 a year is not sufficient to cover the expenses of the legislator during his approximate three-month stay in Salem during a session. Nor do they say it in any way covers the time and extra expense consumed in work required of many of the legislators who are placed on important interim committees. Another measure on which the voters will be asked to vote on would, if approved at the polls, permit the domiciliary hospital to be located near Portland to accept patients for treatment of a general mental illness. It was contended by members of the ways and means committee that it would be unwise to restrict the proposed hospital to the care of aged persons only. Because the board of higher education frequently is bequeathed stock which under present law cannot be retained, the legislature passed and referred to the voters a measure which proposed that the state be permitted to own the corporate stock of a corporation, if such stock is included in gifts or bequests. structure of firebreaks and roads. Liquor-by-Drink

Members of the Oregon Liquor Control commission met with Governor Paul L. Patterson Friday to discuss the date on which the commission will inaugurate liquor by the drink in the state. The liquor commissioners stated that following the conference with the governor, it was planned to meet in the commission offices in the highway building and possible set the date. Originally it had been planned to allow liquor by the drink beginning May 4 but it was found that there would not be sufficient time to process all applications by that date. June 1 has been suggested as the date but the commission has taken no action as yet. At a short morning session the commission held up consideration of four applications for liquor-by-the-drink licenses from Benton county. Also held up was action on a request of the Corvallis city council that no liquor-by-the-drink licenses be issued within the corporate limits of Corvallis. Members of the commission action on the request as well as the Benton county applications would await formulation of a policy by the commission from city councils and county courts.

Replanting of Tillamook Burn

Five million two-year-old Douglas fir seedlings will be replanted in the Tillamook burn during the next six months, while 10,000 acres will be aerial seeded if the seed can be obtained, Rudy Kallander, rehabilitation director of the State Forestry Department, said Friday.

Contracts will be awarded May 8 for cutting snags on 1,300 acres of the Trask area of the burn.

Kallander also said that extensive fire protection projects are planned in the burn, including snag falling, and construction of firebreaks and roads.

The 60-man convict crew in the burn will build firebreaks and roads and fight fires. This is the fourth year of the project to reforest the burn. Other work to be done this summer and fall include replanting surveys on 10,000 acres. At least 6,000 pounds of Douglas fir seed will be bought next fall if it is available.

(Continued from Page 1) Aeronautics Commission, said it was not clear whether the smoke drifting up through the trees came from the wreckage or a survivors fire.

The crash scene was estimated less than half a mile from where another Miami non-schedule line transport hit a mountainside last week. There were 25 aboard that plane, 22 of them soldiers heading for the Far East. Miraculously, 19 of them survived and were rescued by ground parties or helicopters in deep snow.

The search coordinator said, however, that there was no deep snow to hamper rescue operations Friday.

The wreckage was at about the 3,500 or 4,000 foot level on a ridge south of Cedar Lake, about 40 miles southeast of Seattle.

The four airmen aboard the crashed plane were Capt. John Schroeder, Coral Gables; Capt. Maurice Booska, Miami; Co-pilot James Gilbert, Hialeah, and Co-pilot Donald Dwellley, Miami.

At the request of the communists, the resumption of full-scale armistice talks, scheduled for tomorrow, was postponed until 2 p.m. Sunday (9 a.m. Saturday PST.)

(Continued from Page 1) The force of the collision jammed the cycle so tightly into the truck that it remained standing even after being dragged sideways for about 10 feet by the truck. Skid marks left by the cycle to the scene of the crash measured 68 feet.

The two men had borrowed the cycle from a friend, Arthur Mooney, 5165 Skyline road. It was later removed from the scene by a brother of the victim, Vernon Henry, and several other youths.

Raymond Caldwell, 1180 Seventh street, was driver of the truck. He was not cited.

The injured youth is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Edward W. Peterson, 320 Boone road. Henry is survived by his widow, Joan, an expectant mother. Sunday they would have been able to celebrate their first wedding anniversary.

Other survivors include his parents, Mr. and Mrs. John Henry, and brothers Jack and Vernon, all of Salem; Wilbert of Hayward, Calif.; James of Los Angeles, and Earl of Gale's Creek, Ore.; and a sister, Mrs. Eunice Meeder of San Diego, California.
