The city park was established in 1939 as a WPA project. W. S. Lankey as park commissioner in 1951 was instrumental in rebuilding and enlarging the site.

May 9 festivities marked the opening of the season with the program including a concert by the Sweet Home high school band and Foster grade school band; also entertainment by the grade and junior high school pupils.

Records of the park for 1952 show 5,000 new registrants with 1686 out of town cars from as far away as Alaska, Germany and Japan.
