Campus Set For May Week-end

The May festivities will commence tomorrow at 1:30 with a parade through downtown Salem. Willamette's AROTC unit will march, and the university band will provide music for the occasion.

The coronation of the queen will be at 1:30 on Ead lawn, and in case of bad weather the coronation will take place in the gymnasium. Students and guests will dance at 9 o'clock Saturday night at the queen's ball. Sunday morning the YWCA will present a Queen's breakfast at 8:30 in Lausanne hall. May Week-end will end with church Sunday morning.
