Lebanon Bank Deposits Rise

Lebanon — The Bank of Lebanon, established here two years ago, notes through its quarterly report, increased business in all departments. Deposits increased over the last report from \$1,736,480 to \$1,909,785. Total assets of the bank were listed at \$2,275,048 as against \$2,060,850 three months ago. Loans showed a marked increase of \$275,308 during the past quarter. Current loans were listed at \$728,878. Quarterly report in December showed loans of \$481,877.
