Ingredients: ¼ cup butter or margarine, ¾ cup firmly packed brown sugar, 2 cups teaspoon salt, ½ cup granu-lated sugar, 2 tablespoons cornstarch, dash of salt, ½ cup milk, 1/2 cup syrup from canned cling peaches, 2 eggs, 11/2 cup canned cling peaches (diced)

4 teaspoon vanilla.

Method: Cream butter and brown sugar. Crush cornflakes fine and add to creamed mixture with flour and ½ teaspoon salt; mix thoroughly. Press ¾ of mixture into bottom and sides of greased pan (8 by 6 by 2 inches) or deep pie plate. Mix granulated sugar, cornstarch and dash of salt together thoroughly in heavy saucepan; stir in milk and peach syrup until smooth. Cook and stir constantly with a whisk over moderately low heat until thickened. Beat eggs enough to combine yolks and whites; gradually pour cooked mixture over them, stirring vigorously as you do so, return mixture to saucepan. Stir and cook over very low heat 2 min utes. Remove from heat. Add peaches and vanilla. Pour into cornflake shell. Sprinkle with remaining crumbs. Bake in moderate (350 deg.) oven 30 minutes.
