Peach Layer Crisp
Ingredients: 1/4 cup butter or margarine, 1/4 cup firmly packed brown sugar, 2 cups cornflakes, 3/4 cup sifted flour, 1/2 teaspoon salt, 1/2 cup granulated sugar, 2 tablespoons cornstarch, dash of salt, 1/2 cup milk, 1/2 cup syrup from canned cling peaches, 2 eggs, 1 1/2 cups canned cling peaches (diced), 1/2 teaspoon vanilla.

Method: Cream butter and brown sugar. Crush cornflakes fine and add to creamed mixture with flour and 1/2 teaspoon salt; mix thoroughly. Press 3/4 of mixture into bottom and sides of greased pan (8 by 6 by 2 inches) or deep pie plate. Mix granulated sugar, cornstarch and dash of salt together thoroughly in heavy saucepan; stir in milk and peach syrup until smooth. Cook and stir constantly with a whisk over moderately low heat until thickened. Beat eggs enough to combine yolks and whites; gradually pour cooked mixture over them, stirring vigorously as you do so, return mixture to saucepan. Stir and cook over very low heat 2 minutes. Remove from heat. Add peaches and vanilla. Pour into cornflake shell. Sprinkle with remaining crumbs. Bake in moderate (350 deg.) oven 30 minutes. Serve hot, with unsweetened whipped cream if desired. Makes 8 servings. If any of the dessert is left over it will taste delicious reheated in a moderate oven.

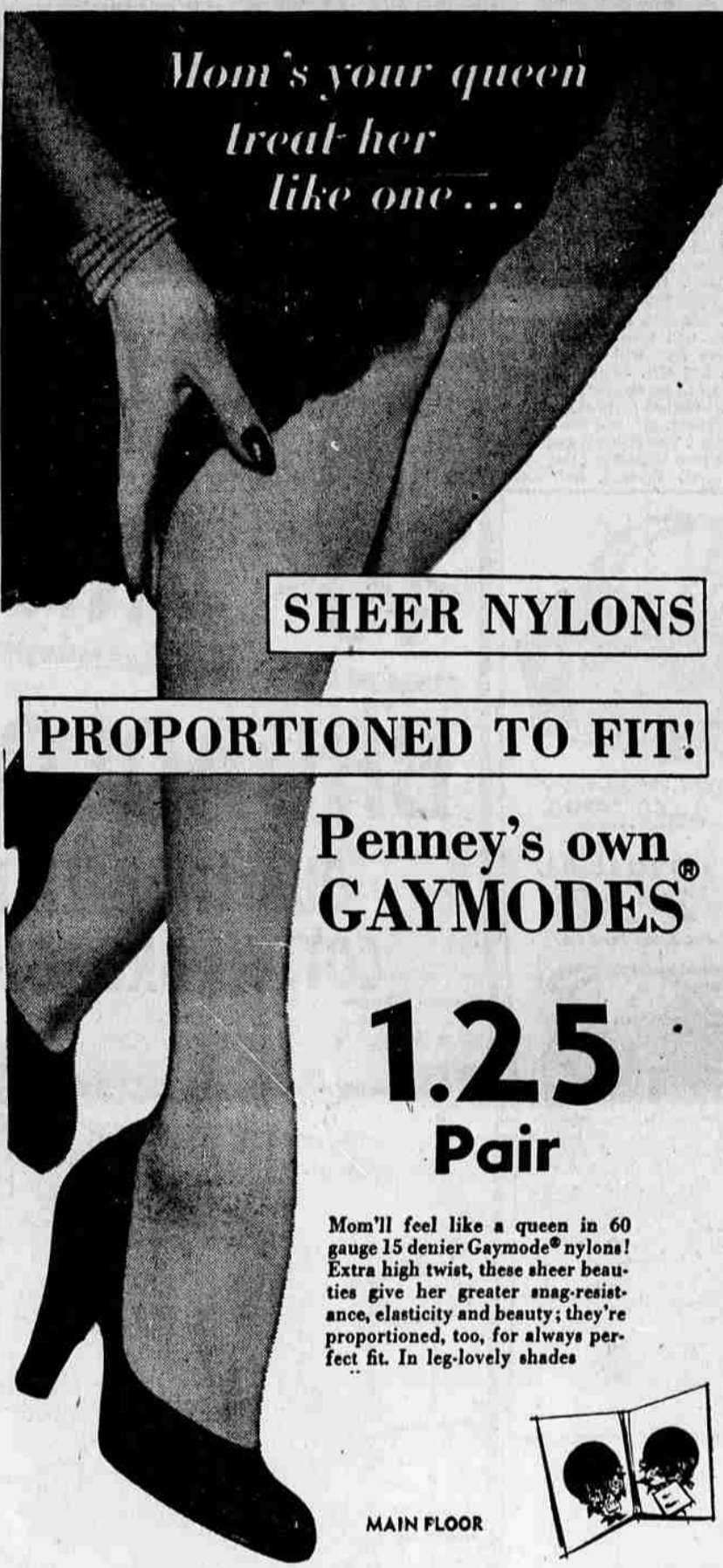

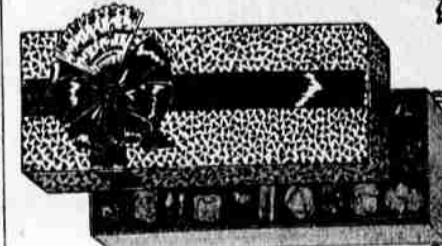
