The group will continue sponsoring the well-child clinic, and clothing for Eola village for migrants in the summer.

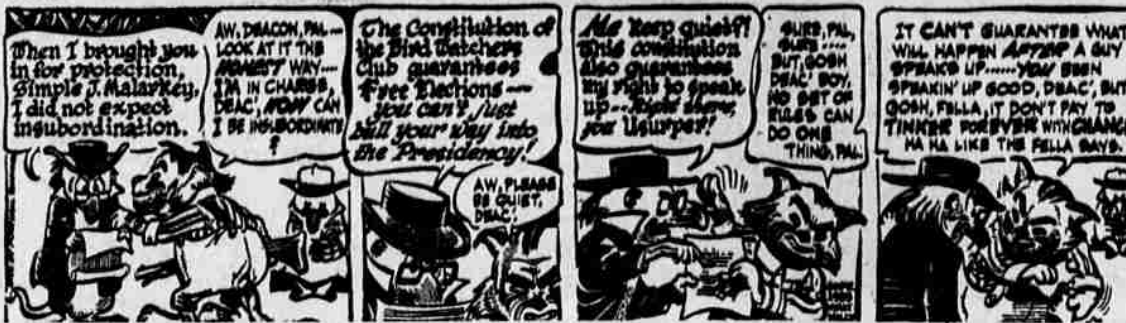
The next regular meeting of the group is Oct. 2.

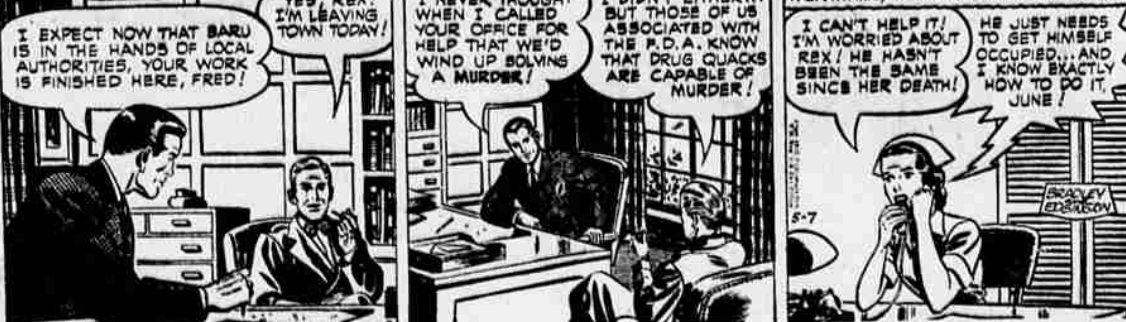
