Airforce Chief Retires, Twining Successor

Washington (AP) — The White House announced Thursday Gen. Hoyt S. Vandenberg is retiring as Air Force chief of staff and will be succeeded by Gen. Nathan F. Twining.  
Twining at present is vice chief of staff. Assuming the Senate confirms his appointment, he will step up to the top Air Force post June 30, when Vandenberg's term expires.  
This is the first change in the Joint Chiefs of Staff since Eisenhower took office, and the White House gave no indication whether it would be followed by other changes.  
Nominated to succeed Twining as vice chief of staff was Lt. Gen. Thomas Dresser White, who would get a fourth star. Twining's appointment is for the usual two years.  
In advance of the White House announcement, the Air Force released an exchange of letters between Vandenberg and Secretary of Air Harold G. Talbot in which Talbot said that he had approved Vandenberg's retirement "with reluctance."  
Vandenberg was originally appointed chief of staff for a four-year term which ended April 30, 1952. At that time his tour of duty was extended for 14 months.  
Vandenberg asked for retirement.  
Vandenberg, now 54, pointed out in his retirement request that he has served more than 34 years and that the last five have been as chief of staff.

Hospital Inmates Attack Attendant and Escape

Two state hospital inmates staged a fight Wednesday night while a third called an attendant to the scene where he was overpowered and his automobile was used by the trio to escape.  
One of them was apprehended Thursday when he returned to his home. The other two are still at large.  
The trio are not mentally ill, the hospital said, but one is described as a psychopath with a long record of car thefts. The other two are alcoholics.  
Valdemar J. Karklins, the attendant on duty in the continued-treatment building where the men were confined, told hospital Superintendent C. E. Bates that he was called to the scene of the staged fight by Thomas Malone, 19, Springfield. As he entered the room where Eugene P. Ferguson, 20, Portland, and Verlin O. Thayer, 39, Toledo, were struggling on the floor, Malone grabbed him from behind and the other two jumped up to help Malone, Karklins said.  
They took Karklins' keys, tied him up and locked him in a broom closet, and took Karklins' car for their getaway. The escape occurred about 10:15 while Karklins was the lone attendant in the building.  
Karklins was released almost immediately after the trio left by another inmate who had witnessed the affair from the ward.  
Thayer, a self-committed alcoholic, was apprehended in Toledo where he had returned

Denial Order In Fish Case

The application for a temporary injunction restraining the state fish commission from enforcing a recent order closing the Columbia river to fishermen above Bonneville dam has been denied by Circuit Judge Rex Kimball.  
The order of closing was attacked in the courts by John Whiz and others of The Dalles. It was contended that the fish commission's action was unreasonable and discriminatory against upper Columbia river fishermen.  
The closure order ends June 13 and Judge Kimball fixed June 18 as the time for hearing arguments in connection with a demurrer filed by the fish commission.

QUEEN To Find Owners of 26 Checks for \$2700

The State Industrial Accident Commission is trying to find the rightful owners of 63 checks, totaling \$2,700. The commission said Thursday that the checks have been mailed to persons entitled to accident benefits, but that the commission doesn't have correct mailing addresses.

Chicago (AP)—Retailing which increased in intensity throughout the session knocked grain prices down for substantial losses on the board of trade Thursday.  
All wheat deliveries tumbled into new season low ground with the May contract at a bottom price for any wheat future since mid-1950. All the contracts also fell to new seasonal lows.  
Heaviest losses occurred in soybeans, down several cents as fears the government would lower the support price for soybean oil, which competes with soybean oil.  
Wheat closed 1 to 1 1/2 lower, May 27 1/4 to 27 3/4; corn 4 to 4 1/2 lower, May 7 1/2 to 7 1/2; soybeans 2 1/2 to 4 cents lower, May 27 1/2 to 27 1/2; and land 20 to 30 cents a hundred pounds lower, May 27 1/2 to 27 1/2.
