Spearheads for the Bearcats in the big meet will be Dean Benson, who last week broke his school's mark in the high hurdles with a 15.1 performance; Bill Van Horn in the sprints; Stan Neperud in the javelin; Jim Hiltzman in the shotput and high jump; Jayton Gilson in the discus; Don Empey and Ralph Stephenson in the distances; and Bob Miller in the quarter-mile.
