Strawberry Floating Island Beverage

Strawberry Floating Island
Ingredients: 1 pint fresh strawberries, 1/4 cup very finely granulated sugar, 4 eggs (separated), 2 cups milk, salt, 1/2 teaspoon vanilla.
Method: Wash strawberries and hull. Slice berries in half; mix with 1/4 cup of the sugar and allow to stand at room temperature while preparing rest of dessert. Put egg yolks in heavy saucepan; beat slightly; gradually stir in sugar, milk and a dash of

salt. Cook and stir constantly over low heat until mixture will coat a silver spoon and is about as thick as heavy cream; this will take about 20 minutes. Cool; stir in 1/2 teaspoon of the vanilla. Divide sugared berries, including juice, among 8 custard cups; spoon cooled custard over; gradually add remaining 1/4 cup of sugar, beating until whites are very stiff; toward end of beating add remaining 1/2 teaspoon vanilla. Pile meringue on top of soft custard. Place cups on cookie sheet in extremely hot (525F.) oven just until meringue is flecked with brown — about 1 1/2 minutes. Makes 8 servings.
