## Ore. Forestry Big Business

"Forestry is big business, especially in this area," Ray Yoder, native of Woodburn and Forestry School faculty member at Oregon State, told Chamber of Commerce members today at the Hotel Senator.

The present day forestry student learns the business as well as the technical side of the subject, Yoder said, adding that he is likely to wind up as a board member of some large corporation which manufactures wood products.

Mrs. Oatis, with whom the correspondent had spent only three months before he went to Prague and subsequently to prison on trumped-up "spy" charges, had to wait a final 15 minutes before she could board the plane.

Asked in the newsreel interview if he would explain the "psychological treatment" which he received, he said: "No, I wouldn't."

Asked if he would say why he was arrested and placed on trial, Oatis shrugged his shoulders and said: "I don't know. It's a very complicated situation. There are so many angles to it."

**Hedges on Arrest**  
Q. Was there justification for your arrest?

A. "That's pretty tough, too. In certain respects they did. They have a different point of view. Their standards are different than ours. Under the law there was a certain justification. They were looking at things differently. In that country the practice of journalism is the worst often amounts to espionage."

Q. From the American viewpoint did you violate any law?

A. "That is not the question. I wish you would understand that. The question was did I violate the laws of Czechoslovakia."

"Did you violate any canons as a newspaperman?"

Oatis bridled and said very testily: "Would you answer a question like that? I'm not going to."

Senator Dean Walker, who made the motion which was adopted, pointed out that there was \$100,000 available in higher education funds for equipment for the dental school, and in addition \$75,000 had been spent for new equipment since the close of the legislature. Further, Walker said, the dental school now has equipment the most of which can be removed from the old to the new building, valued at \$400,000.

Senator Walker declared that the entire purpose of the legislature in making the restrictions it did, was to be certain that the board of higher education did not spend more money for the dental school than that authorized by the legislature.

President of the Senate Eugene Marsh, was elected chairman of the emergency board and Speaker of the House Rudie Wilhelm, Jr., who was absent because of illness, was named secretary.

Present at the meeting Monday in addition to Marsh and Walker were Senators Angus Gibson, Eugene; Howard Bolton, Canby, and Representatives Robert Root of Medford, Francis Ziegler of Corvallis and Dave Baun of La Grande.

On the brighter side Ridgway said "both morale of our forces and the quality of leadership have been improved."

He said too that the development of new weapons is "another source of future strength," adding:

"We can be sure that new weapons will have a powerful effect on combat operations." Summarizes Armed Forces

Detailing the forces which could be thrown into a Communist attack on Western Europe, Ridgway said the nations satellite to Russia have "70-odd divisions" while Russian forces total 175 Army divisions, 200,000 front-line aircraft, "with a large aircraft reserve," and more than 350 submarines.

"Thirty Soviet divisions are located in occupied Europe, of which the 22 in East Germany constitute an ever-present threat to our forward forces," he said.

## Thief Loses Blood, Leaves Coin in Till

A burglar who broke into Alvin's cafe, 4339 South Pacific highway, early Sunday morning, apparently got nothing but some cuts from a broken window pane for his trouble.

Approximately \$125 in the cash register was not touched, said investigating state officers, even though the register was unlocked.

Entry was made through the front door by breaking out the door glass. Blood at the scene indicated that the burglar had cut himself on the broken glass. Marks showed that an attempt had been made to force the rear door first and then the front door was broken, police said.

## Two Accidents Sifted Sunday

Two accidents were investigated by city police Sunday, one resulting in considerable damage to two cars involved in a three-car collision.

A Mulino woman suffered several minor injuries in a three-car accident at the intersection of Church and Center streets about 10 o'clock Monday morning and two of the cars were considerable damaged.

As investigating police reconstructed the accident, cars driven by John E. Vaughn, Mulino, and Oliver W. Blinne, 1155 Ruge street, were driving side by side each on Center street when the southbound car of Kinn F. Wong, 1964 North Capitol street, started across in front of them.

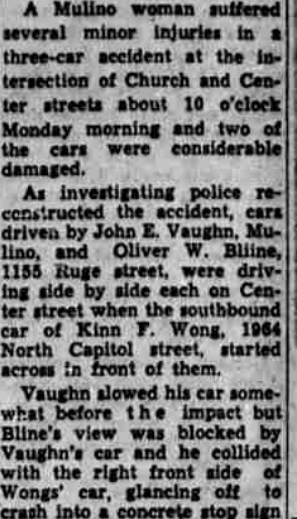

## McKay Signs

The Warm Springs Indians would receive \$4,047,800 and the Umatilla Indians, \$4,196,000, or a per capita payment of \$3,754.91. There are 1,078 Warm Springs Indians and 1,108 Umatillas.

Should the Yakima tribe later negotiate a contract providing for a greater per capita distribution to its 3,637 members, the Warm Springs and Umatilla tribes would receive an additional amount to make their per capita payment the same.

**Contracts Explained**  
T. Leland Brown of The Dalles, one of the attorneys for the Warm Springs tribe, explained to newsmen the contracts in general were predicated on a division of the total value of the Cello fishery distribution on a per capita basis to the Indian tribes which have used the fishing ground. Waters backed up by the dam will inundate it.

He said a total value of about \$33,270,000 had been placed on the fishery. Brown said a pending appropriations bill contains a one million dollar item from which the first payments may be made to the Indians. Congressional approval of this item would mean approval of the contracts, he said.
