

IN SPECIAL CONCERT

Final Concert
By Orchestra

Willamette university chamber orchestra will give its final concert of the school year on Friday, May 22, at 3 p.m. in Waller hall auditorium on campus. The public is invited to attend the concert.

The 25-piece chamber orchestra, under the direction of Dr. Willis Gates, will be heard in four selections.

First number on the program, "Sinfonia X" by Francesco Manfredini, was written in the 18th century. Manfredini's "Sinfonia X" follows the form of the late Baroque "Sonata da Chiesa." The orchestra will follow the authentic instrumentation except for the substitution of the piano for the harpsichord.

Quincy Porter's "Music for Strings," a contemporary American composition, will be offered as the second piece. Written in 1941, the music is light and spirited and easily comprehended.

"Trauermusik" by Hindemith, third concert selection, was written for solo viola and string orchestra on January 21, 1936, the day after the death of King George V of England. The first performance of "Trauermusik" took place the following day in a BBC broadcast with the composer playing the solo part.

The Willamette chamber orchestra will play the first movement of The Mozart Symphony, K. 201 as its final number. The Symphony was written in 1774 when Mozart was only 18 years old. The thematic material is very simple.

Baker School for
Water Fluoridation

At the final meeting of the Baker School Mothers and Dads Club, held Tuesday evening at Baker School, it was unanimously voted to pay \$25 toward the initial installation of the fluoridation system for the Salem water supply, provided that the City Council for Salem takes affirmative action on the fluoridation program within the calendar year 1953.

Petitions bearing the signatures of 87 residents of the Baker School district were turned over to Jason Lee with the request that they be presented to the city council at the next regular meeting. The petition stated that the endorsement of the fluoridation program by the Oregon State Board of Health, United States Public Health Service, The National Association of Water Works, The American Dental Association, and The American Medical Association, was felt to be assurance that fluoridation would be in the public interest.

Several members of the club reported that they were carrying water from the Salem Heights Water District in order to provide drink water for their children which had the benefits of fluoridation.

Silverton Girl Wins
Honor With Marimba

Silverton—Diane Bye, nine years of age, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Perle Bye, was accorded double honors in a recent talent contest among 31 members of the younger group, at a PTA program at Whiskey Hill school district, placing first in her division and also as grand champion.

Diane appeared in a group of numbers playing the marimba presented as a pupil of Miss Aloha Lee Edland. She also is to be a program feature guest at the B&P club's regular meeting the evening of Tuesday, June 2, at Toney's.

The musical presentation, under the direction of band conductor Maurice W. Brennen and Dean Melvin H. Geist, choir director, will be held in the university gymnasium at 8:15 p.m. The public is invited to attend.

Sunday evening's performance will mark the first time since 1944 that the band and choir have been featured together in concert. The two organizations will present the West Coast premiere performance of "The Closing Doxology" by Norman Lockwood. Based on a religious text, Psalm 150, the composition is treated in a highly contemporary manner. It was composed in 1950 and published in 1952. "The Closing Doxology", which places a good deal of emphasis on the percussion instruments, is extremely unusual in its modern tone combinations, rhythm and harmonic structure.

The Concerto in A minor, by Robert Schumann, will feature Jane Gray, junior from Portland, as soloist. The special band transcription was made by Maurice Brennen. Other band selections will include compositions by Gordon Jacob, William Schumann, Franck-Harding, Gene Ogden and Albert Ingalls.

Wheat Growers to
Record Acreages

The future acreage of wheat may be marketed under purchase agreements and crop loans may be at stake this week. The PMA office at 440 North Church street is urging all farmers to record their 1951-52 and 53 wheat acreage with them before May 20. If wheat acreage allotments become necessary in 1954 these figures will be used as a basis for wheat allowance.
