

500 'Hams' and Families To Converge on Salem

Code speed contests, talks by men well up in the communications field, dinners and tours will be incorporated in the three day program of the 16th annual convention of the Oregon Amateur Radio Association, which convenes at the Marion hotel Friday afternoon.

The convention is expected to attract some 500 persons, "hams" and their families from Oregon, Idaho, Montana and British Columbia.

Registration is scheduled for Friday evening, but the serious business of the conference will not get under way until Saturday morning when Governor Paul L. Patterson

Seed Certification Deadlines Are Near

Deadlines for seed certification applications are rapidly nearing says Marion County Extension Agent Hollis Ottaway.

The June 1 deadline on alta fescue and highland bentgrass will effect most of the local grass seed growers. Other crops effected however, include Tussock oatgrass, bluegrass, and the Creeping red fescues.

Certification of crimson and subterranean clover fields requires immediate action. Since both are blossoming at the present time, the field inspection will necessarily have to be made within the next few days.

Seeding inspections are required on several Marion county legume seed crops. These inspections are made when the seed crop is only two or three inches high and determine the number of volunteer plants in the field. Red clover, Birdfoot trefoil, and Big trefoil must all have seedling inspections.
