

Open Letter Addressed To Marion Co. People

The Hollywood Lions Club gave \$178 Wednesday to the Marion county blood program. But the program is still short of the \$5500 that it must have by June 15 if the program is to be continued, and the situation has caused Dr. Henry E. Morris, chairman of the Marion County Blood Bank Program, to address an open letter to the people of Marion county, urging their support.

For the convenience of anyone who wants to contribute the program's address is P. O. Box 31, Salem.

The letter follows:

"Because you have responded to an urgent need, because you opened your hearts and hands to the community, we

thank you. The Marion County Blood Bank presented an appeal to you, an appeal for the sum of \$5,500 to keep the free blood program in operation for you and your families. You responded by freely giving over \$3,000 to the fund.

"Because the need is here, for you to see; because the blood program will be discontinued if sufficient funds are not raised, we refuse to scale a campaign. We will not visit your homes, or call upon you for money. Our aim is simply to inform you of the situation. The result lies in your hands.

"The present blood program is operated on a non-commercial basis. Blood is given to local hospitals at no cost. The only charge made to patients who require transfusions is that of the administration of the blood by hospital personnel. This free service will be eliminated on July 1, if at least \$5,500 is not raised by June 15.

"Already many business firms, service clubs, organizations, and individuals have offered time and funds to the blood program. Thus, this letter. We cannot express it to you individually, so we have presented our attitude collectively, through the press.

"Thank you."

New Milk Price In Effect June 1

Portland (AP)—A new milk price order will go into effect in nine Oregon counties June 1, following the recent Portland formula that reduced the producer price and gave richer milk to consumers at no added cost.

The State Board of Agriculture Wednesday reported that the order affects producers, wholesalers and retailers of Washington, Clackamas, Wasco, Hood River, Marion, Linn, Tillamook, Lincoln and Yamhill counties.

The producer minimum will be 78 cents a pound for butterfat and \$3.16 a hundredweight for milk. This means a cut for Clackamas and Washington County producers of 32 cents a pound of butterfat, and a cut of 17 cents for those in the other counties.

Tillamook and Linn County producers will get 16 cents a hundredweight more for milk; Lincoln, Hood River, Wasco and Marion County producers will get 29 cents more and Clackamas and Washington County producers will get 89 cents more in the minimum milk price schedule.
