STATE OF OREGON County of Marion Clear Lake School District No. 122 NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN that at the school district bond election hereby called to be held at the school house of Clear Lake School District, in and for the County of Marion, Oregon, on the 28th day of May, 1953, between the hours of two o'clock and eight o'clock p.m., there will be submitted to the legal voters thereof the question of contracting a bonded indebtedness in the sum of Twenty Thousand Dollars (\$20,000.00) for the purpose of providing funds with which to construct, improve, repair, equip and furnish a school room and buildings or additions thereto, in and for said school district.
