He disclosed plans for the session to the National Assembly just a few hours before it voted on whether he should continue to head the French government.

In a statement, President Eisenhower described the "British purpose" of the U. S.-British-French meeting at "further to develop common viewpoints with these friends on the many problems that must be solved cooperatively so that the cause of world peace may be advanced."

In London, Churchill told Parliament: "My main hope is that we may take a definite step forward to a meeting of far graver import" — with Russian Prime Minister Georgii M. Malenkov.

There was a discussion in government quarters here to stress that the Western powers have many problems among themselves to warrant the meeting and to minimize talk in public about a possible big four session.

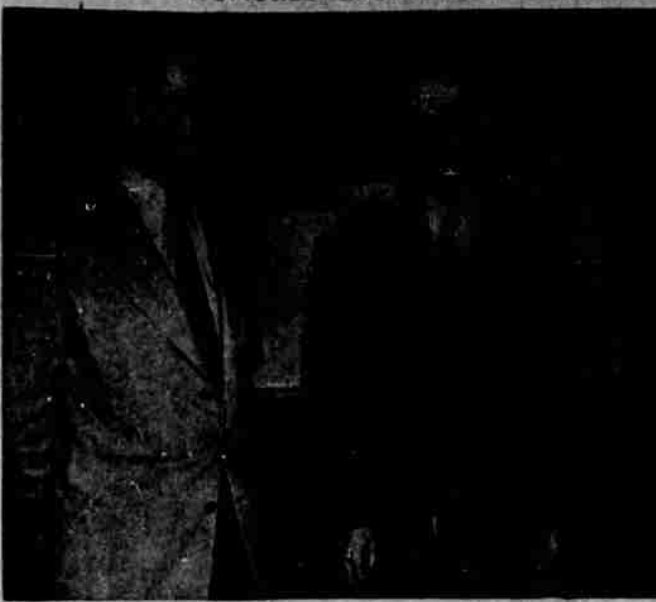

Ray Smith Honored by Students and Lawyers

Professor Ray L. Smith, for 37 years a member of the law college faculty at Willamette university and who will retire when the present senior class graduates, was honored by more than 100 fellow instructors, jurists and students during a dinner held at the Senator hotel Thursday noon.

Professor Smith, himself a graduate of Willamette, was praised by Judge George R. Duncan as a capable instructor, especially in the field of constitutional law, a great credit to Willamette and whose work as a teacher will bear fruits in the minds of those students who have worked under him.

Judge Duncan pointed to the great strides the law college has made during the past quarter of a century and expressed the belief that it was probably the outstanding institution of its kind on the coast. Judge Duncan, a former student under Professor Smith, now has a son on the campus.

The honored guest paid tribute to the men and women with whom he has been associated. When he was a student Senator Charles L. Mc-

State Making

Chairman Chandler said that an effort was made at the last Legislature to prevent the Highway Commission from following this plan, but added that there were "enough far sighted men in the Legislature to bring about the defeat of this effort."

"We are hanging tough on this policy," he said, "and feel sure that in the years to come our policy will be fully vindicated."

Following the meeting the commission, together with members of the highway department, traveled over a long stretch of relocated highway that will replace the present U. S. 99 south of Eugene to Roseburg and Grants Pass.

For the most part the new roadway will be two lanes for the time being, but sufficient right of way has been obtained to install the two additional lanes as soon as traffic demands and money is available.

It was pointed out that the commission is expending approximately \$6,000,000 a year on rights of way in the state to carry out this program, a cost that need not be repeated after the required land has been acquired.

Of particular interest in the travels Wednesday was the fact that the newly located U. S. 99 just south of Cottage Grove follows the original Jesse Applegate trail laid out

in the early days of the state, later becoming a county road. Under the highway program the Applegate trail is being transformed into a modern high speed freeway.

County, city and Chamber of Commerce officials of Roseburg gave a chicken dinner for the highway commissioners and members of the party Wednesday night.

"We are not asking the highway commission for a thing tonight," Arthur Flegel, ex-mayor, and a legislator, said. "We'll save that for the morning."

Highway Commissioner Reynolds keynoted the park and recreation program sponsored by the commission and is being carried out by Chester Armstrong, superintendent of state parks.

"We anticipate that five million out-of-state people will use state parks during the coming season and the more attractive we can make our parks the more people will not only visit them, but tell their friends out-of-state about them and urge them to come," Reynolds said.

In carrying out its plan of relocating U. S. 99 the State Highway Commission, following numerous hearings, has routed the roads to bypass numerous communities. Among these cities and towns that are by-passed by a distance ranging from one mile to as high as nine miles are Drain, Yoncalis, Oakland, Sutherlin, Wilbur, Winchester and Roseburg.

Highway department officials declared that members of the city councils of these communities expressed virtually every case with the only objection coming from owners of filling stations and a city court located on the present U. S. 99.

R. H. Baldock, highway engineer, said that 140 miles of U. S. 99 from the Washington line to the California border were being transformed into freeway in the present two-year program, of which two years has already passed with but three to go.

Thursday the commission party visited projects along U. S. Highway 99 from Roseburg to Grants Pass, after which the party went to Cave Junction for a luncheon stop; then the caravan proceeded down Smith River to the coast in Gold Beach for an overnight stop.

On Friday the commission will proceed to Coquille where Chairman Ben Chandler will be honored as first citizen of Coos county. Governor Paul Patterson will participate in the celebration, it was learned today.
