### County Budget Balanced Within the Legal Limit

The Marion county budget committee, after laboring through three days of statistics and checking the requests of the several departments, late Wednesday came up with a budget that balances within the 6 per cent limitation.

The final hearing will be held at 10 a.m. Monday, June 29 when it is expected the stamp of approval will be placed upon the document as compiled by the committee's secretary.

As had been anticipated the budget balancing was accomplished through the expedient of finding revenues in excess of those outlined in the preliminary survey. In addition the committee trimmed various requests for salary raises and eliminated virtually all items of capital improvements. The latter will be taken care of, for the most part, from funds allocated to the construction and equipment of the court house.

The request of the county planning and zoning committee for \$16,375 was shaved to \$12,000 while the budget group allotted \$3,000 by way of assisting in the construction of a veterans building at Aurora.

The allotment of \$293,638 approved for the state in connection with welfare work was approved. Members of the budget committee included County Judge Rex Hartley, County Commissioners E. L. Rogers and Roy Rice; Delmer Davidson, Pat McLaughlin and Loyal Warner.

Everett (AP) — O. L. Albery, Goldbar chiropractor, pleaded guilty Wednesday to manslaughter in connection with the death of a diabetic patient and was sentenced to a maximum of 20 years in the state penitentiary.

Superior Judge Edward M. Nollmeyer suspended the sentence because of Albery's health and placed him on probation for three years.

Albery was charged in the death of Mrs. Marjorie Westbrook, 30, of Albany, Ore., a diabetic, May 14, 1951. Prosecutor Phil Sheridan accused Albery of advising Mrs.

### Westbrook to reduce amount of insulin she had been taking.

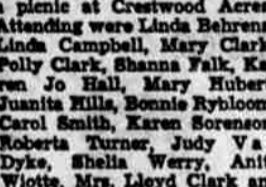
