- Beefburgers with Dill Barbecue Sauce
- Ingredients: 2 tablespoons of butter or margarine, 1 medium-sized onion (chopped), 1 cup catchup, 1/4 cup dill pickle liquid, 1/4 cup minced dill pickles, 1/4 cup minced celery, 1 teaspoon brown sugar, 1/4 teaspoon salt, 1 1/2 pounds ground beef, 1 1/2 teaspoons salt.
- Method: Melt butter in a saucpan over low heat. Add onion and cook until partly tender—5 to 10 minutes. Gradually stir in catchup, dill pickle liquid, dill pickles, celery, brown sugar and 1/4 teaspoon salt. Cook over low heat, stirring often, 20 minutes. Makes about 1 1/2 cups sauce. Meanwhile mix beef and 1/4 teaspoon salt; shape into 6 patties. Broil until done, turning toasted hamburger rolls with sauce spooned over them.
