The Oregon School Activitles Association ruled yester-day that no playoffs will be held to determine a champion. The decision was made by the OSSA board of control in a OSSA board of control in a telephone conversation, according to Tom Pigott, secretary.

Rain and wet grounds forced the OSSA to cancel the state class 'A' baseball tourney at Albany and the 'B' meet at Drain last week.

The board ruled that prep baseball "is terminated at the regional level." It voted to award trophies to eight regional class A titlists and four B champs.

Reasons for the decision were (1) all teams cannot continue to participate. (2) playoffs would conflict with graduation in some cases, and (3) the weather for a proposed playoff is too uncertain.
