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Lightning Hits Lebanon Lines

Lebanon — Lightning struck the Crown Zellerbach paper mill early Sunday evening with a resultant production loss of 13 hours. The transformer bank near the mill was first struck and the bolt streaked into the

mill blowing out switches and breakers. Heavy transmission lines leading into the plant from highway 20 were sheared. The city was without power only eight minutes when the mill was crippled. Kenneth Sims, Mountain States power manager here, said that lightning hit both power lines in the Spicer district, burned out another in Tallman and knocked out several in the Knox butte area and around Albany. The storm was accompanied

by a downpour of rain and hail. At the paper mill plant officials rejoiced that overload switches functioned properly, keeping the high surge of power from damaging equipment. The mill resumed production at 4 p.m. Monday. Largest mill loss was that of production time. Nearly all the oil switches were knocked out and the entire electric system had to be isolated until the complete system was checked for damage.

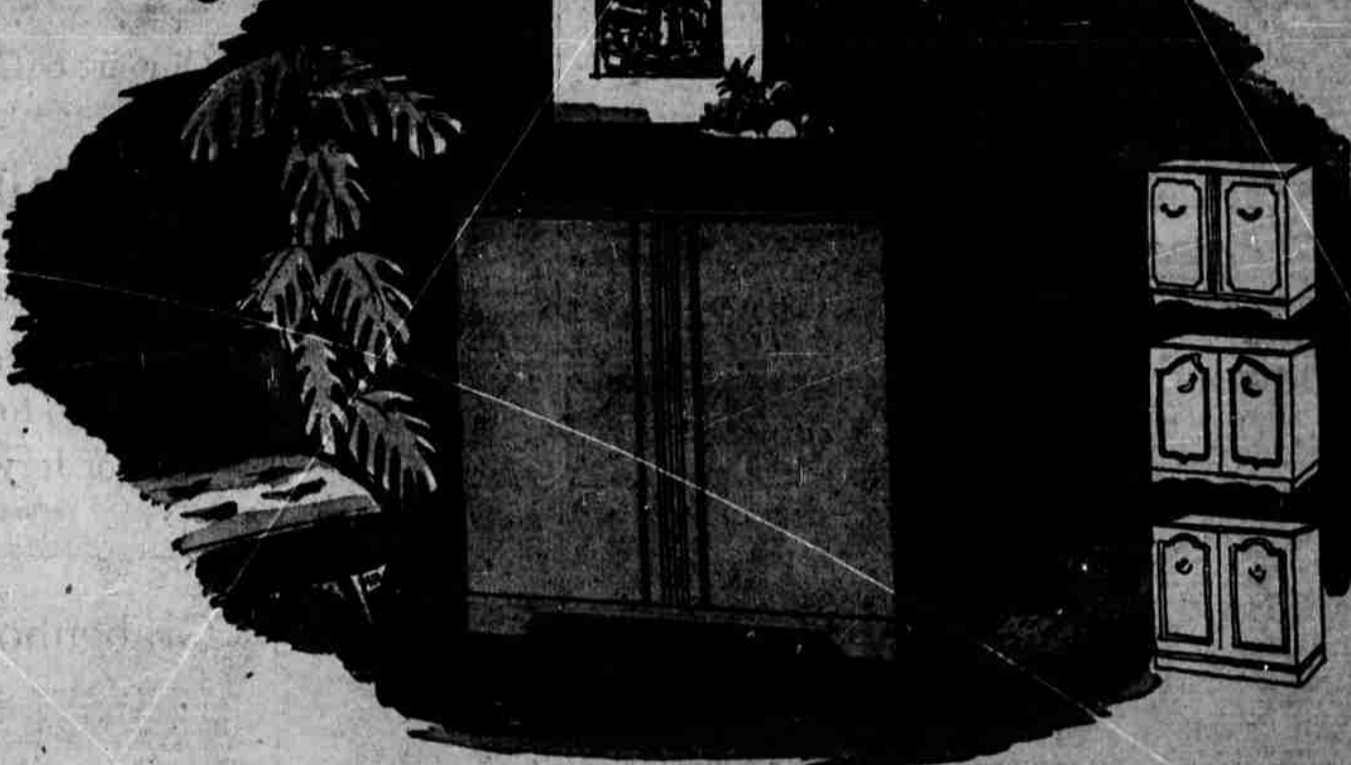

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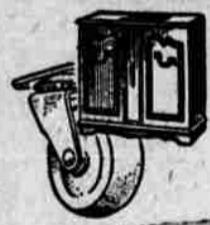
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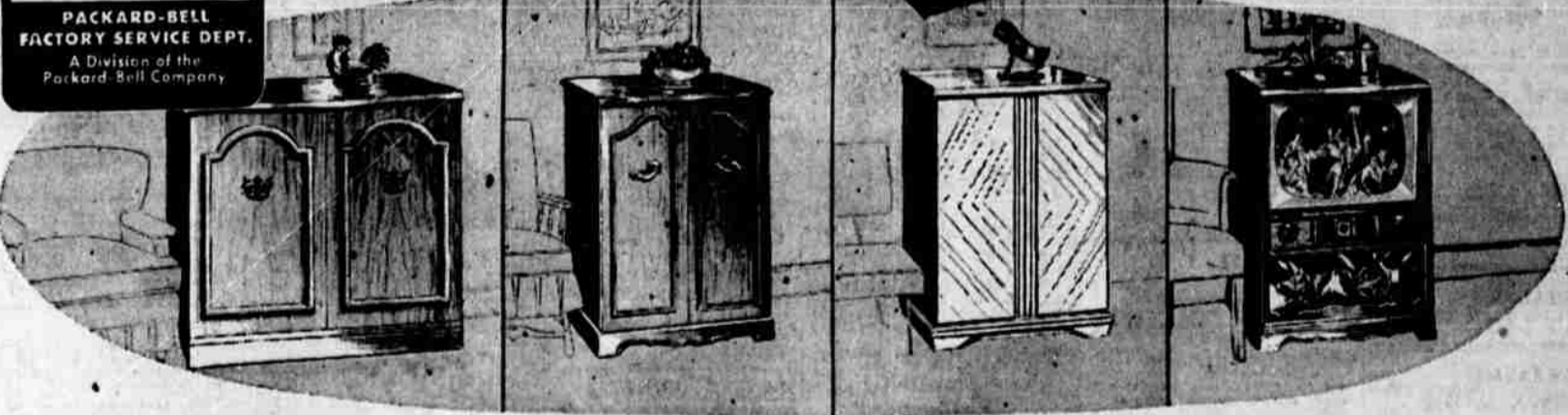


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
