Ingredients: One 10-ounce package washed and cleaned spinach, 1 tablespoon olive oil, 1 tablespoon Roquefort cheese, 1 tablespoon cooking sherry, salt.

Method: Rinse spinach in cold water; drain. Heat olive oil in large skillet or good-size saucepan over low heat; add spinach; cover. Cook spinach in just the water clinging to leaves, turning a few times with a fork, until wilted. Crumble in Roquefort; add sherry; cover; continue cooking over low heat, turning a few times, from 3 to 5 minutes. Sprinkle lightly with salt to taste. Makes 3 servings.
