

Alumni Activities Will Honor Dr. Morton Peck

Willamette university's alumni day activities Saturday will center around recognition of the work of Dr. Morton E. Peck, professor emeritus in the field of botany and curator of Peck herbarium.

Climax of the day will come at 8 o'clock Saturday night at the Marion where a banquet will be held in honor of Dr. Peck. Appearing on the banquet program will be Herman Clark, a alumni association president; Dr. Vern Bain, vice president; Dr. Cecil Monk, head of the university biology department; and President G. Herbert Smith, Dr. G. C. Bellinger, Howard Miller and the guest of honor.

Dr. Peck came to Willamette in 1908 and shortly thereafter began the field work that has resulted in the collection of some 27,000 botanical specimens.

Prior to joining the faculty at Willamette, Dr. and Mrs. Peck spent more than two years in British Honduras, where they collected tropical plants for Kew Gardens in London, the Royal Gardens in Berlin, University of Nebraska, Harvard university and Iowa State College.

Dr. Peck is the author of "A Manual of the Higher Plants in Oregon," a volume that is used as a textbook in many schools. He is currently engaged in revising this work.

Registration for returning alumni will be held at Laussane Hall at 9 a.m. Saturday. This will be followed at 10 a.m., 11 a.m. and 8 p.m. by a special course for graduates. VA Expects Loan Increase

The state veterans affairs department expects a big increase in its loan business because the interest rates on federal GI loans has been increased from 4 to 4 1/2 per cent.

The state's interest rate remains at 4 per cent, making the state loans more attractive.

Under the federal program, the loans are made by private lending agencies. Under the state program, the state loans the money directly.

Beginning July 21, the maximum state loan will be increased to \$9,000 for purchase of homes, and \$18,000 for farms. The present ceiling is \$6,000 for homes and farms.

Hint of Radioactive Dust Found in Salem

Radioactive dust particles from Monday's atomic cannon test in Nevada were detected in nine Oregon cities, the state civilian defense office said Wednesday.

But the amount of radiation was only one hundredth as much as from the luminous dial of an ordinary wrist watch.

In Oregon, radioactivity was strongest in La Grande. Next highest readings were in Hood River, Portland, Milwaukie, Salem, Albany, Bend, Eugene and Astoria.

Strong winds and rainy weather put Oregon in the path of the particles. Tests were made under the supervision of Dr. Arthur F. Scott of Reed college, chief of radiological monitoring for the state civil defense agency.
