Consolidation Involved In Election Monday

Whether two small school districts — Halls Ferry and Mountain View — will be consolidated with Salem, will be determined during an election to be held the afternoon of Monday, June 15.

Voter eligibility is the same as for any other school election and a majority vote will rule. Halls Ferry and Mountain View vote separately as to whether they wish to join Salem. Salem voters will decide whether they want one or both of the outside districts to come into the Salem district.

According to compilations made by C. C. Ward, Salem district clerk, there will be little if any difference in the tax rate in case the consolidation is voted.

Halls Ferry, with an enrollment of 38 pupils in two rooms and a school census of 77, has an actual valuation for the district of \$323,585 and an assessed valuation of \$119,719. The school site is 1.5 acres.

Mountain View has an enrollment of 49 in charge of two teachers. The assessed valuation of the district is \$213,105 and the actual valuation is placed at \$645,773. The school ground area is two acres.

The Salem school district educates its students at an average cost of \$243.72; Halls Ferry \$304.44, and Mountain View \$261.23.

The outside districts will vote at their respective school houses, while the Salem school board will have 11 polling places, identical with those that were in operation for the recent special election.

2 Workshops For Summer

Two special workshops will be conducted during the summer school at Willamette university beginning June 18, and continuing through August 2.

A language arts workshop, designed for four hours each afternoon for eight days, will be introduced for the first time. The program will be directed by Dr. Howard W. Runkel, professor of speech; Dr. Muroe Ringnald, professor of journalism; George Edwards, instructor in English; and Margaret Burroughs, instructor in
