Three-Flavor Prune Salad

Ingredients: 16 large cooked prunes (drained), 5 slices bacon, one 8-ounce container creamstyle cottage cheese, 2 tablespoons mayonnaise, 4 teaspoons finely diced green pepper, romaine.

Method: Make a slit in each prune and remove pit. Cook bacon until crisp; crumble or cut fine; there should be about 1/3 cup. Mix cottage cheese and mayonnaise together; stir in bacon. Mound a level tablespoon of the cheese mixture over inside surface of each flattened pitted prune. Sprinkle each cottage cheese mound with 1/4 teaspoon green pepper. Arrange 2 romaine leaves on each of 4 salad plates; with small spatula, carefully place prunes on romaine. Makes 4 servings.
