Woodland Setting for Pontifical High Mass

Sublimity—An altar decked with bouquets of purple, yellow and white flowers flanked by a large American flag on one side and the memorial monument dedicated to the veterans of World War I on the other side, all in a setting of tall fir and stately oaks formed a setting for the Pontifical outdoor high mass Sunday.

The ceremonies were held in the grove at Sublimity in honor of the golden jubilee of St. Boniface Court, Catholic Order of Foresters.

His Excellency, Archbishop Edward D. Howard was celebrant of the mass with Rev. Joseph Scherbring, assistant priest; Rev. Math Jonas, deacon; Prior Martin Pollard and Rev. Albert Bauman, assistant deacons; Rev. Thomas Brockhaus, master of ceremonies; Frater Eugene Esch sub-deacon with Fraters Leo Remnele and Benedict Suing assisting.

Rev. Richard Hodge, O.F.M., of San Francisco delivered the sermon.

The men's choir was under the direction of William Lulay with Miss Margaret Laux at the organ.

Sunshine streaking through

the trees, together with the singing of birds interwove a touch of nature throughout the solemn services of the mass.

Following the services dinner was served to the archbishop and visiting clergy by the Women's Catholic Order of Foresters.

Family groups and friends gathered in small groups to partake of their basket lunches. The lunch stand and amusements were under the direction of the C.O.F. and W.C.O.F. Band music was furnished during the noon hour by a group from Mt. Angel.

At 2 p.m. a program was presented on a specially constructed platform on which were two beautiful bouquets from the C.O.F. of Stayton and the Knights of Columbus.

Edward J. Bell acted as master of ceremonies with the address of welcome being given by Ted Minden, chief ranger, and state chief ranger.

Rev. Joseph Scherbring extended the welcome from St. Boniface parish. Next were two vocal selections by Gerald Neitling with Marilyn Minden accompanist.

Don Orange, high court insurance field representative

for Oregon, spoke on fraternalism.

Congratulation letters from the east and other lodges in nearby towns were among those read.

Fifty year pins were presented to the honored guests, Matt Van Handel, Portland; Lou M. Doerfler, Mehama; Jacob Schmidt and Edmund Meier of Sublimity, the four living charter members of an original group of 34 who formed St. Boniface Court, C.O.F.

The principal address was given by His Excellency, Archbishop Edward D. Howard.

St. Boniface Court No. 1400 was established with 34 charter members June 25, 1903 by Dan J. Malarkey of Portland, the first state chief ranger of Oregon.

The organization became active in various phases of community life, being one of the first fraternal groups in the parish. The Catholic Foresters hall erected in 1907 was one of the early achievements of the members.

The association adopted a resolution in favor of complete sick and hospital benefits with the membership to underwrite the cost.

The recent move by the post office department to eliminate small rural post offices in favor of distribution by rural carriers at a saving of about 50 per cent, was favored by Harold E. Young, post inspector of Salem, in his talk to the delegates.

John W. Emeigh, national secretary of the carriers, spoke in favor of a system whereby each class of mail was made responsible for the cost of the service. Adding an extra load on first class mail to reduce the annual deficit was not favored by Emeigh.
