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Flood Toll Now at 484

Tokyo (AP) — Swirling floodwaters receded slowly today from devastated Wakayama Province, but the weather bureau warned of more floods on central Honshu, main Japanese island.

National police reported the toll at Wakayama, 200 miles southwest of Tokyo, has reached 484 dead, 1,194 injured and 2,224 missing.

U. S. and Japanese mercy teams brought in food and supplies for thousands of refugees from the flash floods that thundered down Wakayama's narrow mountain valleys from rain-swollen streams last weekend.

Police tallied up this property toll: 4,104 houses washed away, 1,763 destroyed and 1,680 damaged.

Kyushu island, where a great flood three weeks ago left 700 dead, was hit again by new rains today. About 15 were killed and 13 missing, police reported.
