

Registered Guernseys Here for Reduction Sale

Seventy head of registered Guernsey cattle are quartered at the Oregon State Fair grounds, in preparation for the reduction sale of the Retedale-Eirason Guernsey herds, owned by L. L. Lombard and Ray J. Hobson of Klamath Falls.

The sale will include about 35 cows and an equal number of heifers, all purebred Guernseys, including some that have been in the winner's circle at Salem and other Valley fairs. Twelve of the cows have been classified "Very Good." Seven of them are dry and will have calves in the near future, while others will be fresh between now and November. They have production records up to 749 pounds of butterfat, and all have completed production records, or are on test.

Ladybird Beetles Good to Have Around

Owners of birch trees will get some satisfaction from the fact that not all insects are harmful.

Ladybird beetles, commonly called lady bugs, may now be found feeding on the aphids that have damaged most birch trees in the Salem area this spring.

Although most gardeners can recognize adult ladybugs, many do not know the larval and pupal stages, both of which may be found on the same leaf with the adults. Larvae and adults both feed on aphids.

Various species of adult ladybird beetles usually are red, yellow, or orange colored, with or without black spots. The larvae stage of at least one species is velvety black or grayish with small, rather indistinct, orange spots. The larvae are more elongated and flatter than adult ladybird beetles.

Timber Tract Loans Opposed

Washington (AP)—The office of the comptroller of currency raised objection Monday at a Senate banking subcommittee hearing to a bill which would permit national banks to make loans of up to 10 years on timber tracts.

Sen. Cordon R., Ore. and Rep. Ellsworth R., Ore., sponsors of the bill, urged its approval. Officials of the Bureau of Land Management and the Forest Service expressed belief it would be a step in the right direction. Bankers and lumbermen endorsed it.

But W. M. Taylor, deputy comptroller of the currency, expressing doubts of his office, said:

"The office of the comptroller of the currency recommends that loans secured by mortgages on timberlands be restricted to those which will be liquidated from the immediate or short-term utilization of mature timber, and that such loans should not be made for a longer period than three years."

"There would be no objection to legislation permitting loans secured by timberlands if the loans are so restricted," he added.

Adventists Plan Hi-School

Gladstone (AP)—The Seventh-day Adventist church plans to build a million-dollar high school at Milo, east of Canyonville in southern Douglas county.

Dr. Andrew Nelson, president of the Philippine Union college, Sunday told the Adventists' annual camp meeting here, that construction will begin this fall on two dormitories and other buildings.

He said that about \$200,000 already had been spent on the 447-acre tract to install a water system and build a dairy and several barns.

Students attending the school will be permitted to earn tuition by working on the school farm, he said. The proposed dormitories will house about 150 students each.

Asks Cancelling Of Alcoa Deal

Washington (AP)—Att. Gen. Brownell Monday asked a court order cancelling a contract by Aluminum Co. of America Alcoa to buy 1,200,000,000 pounds of aluminum from Aluminum Ltd., of Canada over a six-year period.

The Justice Department said a petition filed in U. S. District Court in New York contends the contract "confers competitive advantages upon Alcoa, preserves its position and powers in an industry in which competitive conditions consistent with law do not exist, and threatens to impede and prevent the creation of such conditions."
